Buying Province's Cattle
for Breeding Purposes
of State

Many Enquiries

Carloads from Carleton
County, Stanley Doug-
las and Harvey

The State of Maine wants New Brunswick Jersey cattle to augment its own stock, which was greatly depleted because of last year's drought in the west which killed off great quantities of superior cattle. In recent weeks there have been many enquiries from not only the State of Maine but other states in the Union, eager for information of New Brunswick cattle.

Stanley Wood, superintendent of livestock in the N. B. Department of Agriculture, today affirmed the reports of enquiries received in this province and declared that there was possibility of Maine buying a considerable number of Jerseys from this province.

Breeding Purposes

Already one carload of Jerseys—nineteen head in all—have been shipped from the Douglas area to Skowhegan, Maine, where M. D. Tupper of that place is using them for breeding purposes.

A second shipment is expected to be shipped from Stanley and Douglas within a week or two. There is a great demand for first class New Brunswick stock. It is anticipated that there will be a number of head of head of cattle sent from Carleton county and Harvey to points in Maine and also in New Jersey.

It was pointed out here today that with no serious duty to interfere that shipments should increase within the next few weeks.

A Better Market!

From Upper Canada it is learned that approximately 100,000 head of heavy cattle have been exported from Canada to the United States in the first ten months of this year. The U. S. tariff on live cattle is three cents a pound when the animal is over 700 pounds and two and a half cents when the animal is over 700 pounds and two and a half cents when below that weight, so that a 1,100-pound steer would meet a customs duty of \$33.

The year has witnessed an entire reversal in the export trade in Canadian cattle, it is learned. Last year nearly all Canadian cattle exports for the first ten months went to the United Kingdom. For the corresponding period this year they were 6,500 whereas the shipments to United States jumped from 4,700 cattle and calves last year to 117,000 this year. The reason for the shift was the shortage of beef cattle in the United States and relatively lower prices in United Kingdom market. When live cattle went into the United States free Canadian cattle shipments occasionally reached 400,000 annually but the average shipments were below that.

for Appellate Division
Opening Tuesday

One Special Appeal

The Appellate Division of the New Brunswick Supreme Court will have its November sitting commencing on Tuesday, with only five cases docketed. It is one of the smallest dockets in several years. Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter and Justices Grimmer and Harrison are expected to preside.

One of the cases is a special appeal, Andrew W. Haslett being the appellant against The Workmen's Compensation Board respondent. A. B. Gilbert of Saint John, for the appellant will support an appeal from a decision of the Workmen's Compensation Board.

Another appeal is from the King's Bench Division, William Rains Webster, et al vs. Connors Brothers, Ltd. C. F. Inches, K.C., for the defendant will move to set aside judgment of Chief Justice Barry of October 5, 1935 and restore his judgment of April 16, 1935.

Teach Youth Physical
and Social Life

An organization meeting of a Y. M.C.A. Board of directors is taking place this evening at the city hall, when a permanent organization will be formed.

Another feature of such work for the near future is a community Y.M.C.A. club for boys between the ages of ten and fifteen, organization of which is now being completed by Ralph J. Albrant, general secretary of Y.M.C.A. activities here.

Mr. Albrant is keenly interested in this special work. "Through play the boys will learn the lesson of social behaviour and will learn to take their bumps without malice," he says. "They'll be able to win graciously and lose with a smile and learn also co-operation with teammates in the games they play."

These groups of boys will be trained in physical development and health exercises through group games. These boys' groups will get underway at the first of the week with the boys from ten to twelve commencing work at St. Paul's United church on November 11, and the boys between the ages of thirteen and fifteen starting to work out at Brunswick Street Baptist on November 12.

Mr. Albrant points out that there will be such classes for older boys and young men, of course, with more elaborate physical activity.

School Board Has Issued
32 Permits Since
School Opened

Families Move To City

Measles Among School
Children But Not
Serious

Fredericton board of school trustees in issuing a total of thirty-two permits to pupils within the past two months has established something of a record. Ordinarily the pupils applying for permits after the regular school opening are very few. R. D. Hanson, secretary of the school board, said today that quite a number of families have moved to the city from the rural sections since school commenced.

While the situation is not serious nor of an epidemic nature the Fredericton school board is taking steps to investigate sporadic cases of measles among the school children of the city and to prevent any spread of the disease, which is more manifest this fall than for several years. R. D. Hanson, secretary of the school board, took occasion to point out to The Daily Mail today that the situation is not a "scare" one. The school board and the Board of Health are acting at once to check further cases. For the past several weeks there have been a number of cases of measles among the children, absentees being more numerous on this account.

Board of Trade Discuss-
es Operating a Credit
Reporting Bureau

Executive Meeting

S. S. Miller Selected to
Attend Maritime Bd.
at Halifax Nov. 20

At an executive meeting of the Fredericton Board of Trade held yesterday afternoon at the board offices, S. S. Miller was selected to represent the local Board of Trade at the meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade at Halifax on November 20 and 21. The motion was made by Frank L. Cooper and seconded by William Walker. W. W. Hubbard, president, occupied the chair.

The Board held some discussion on a credit reporting bureau and it was decided to operate this bureau for the benefit of retail merchants. This will be put in operation within a short time it was indicated. One of the principal functions of such a credit bureau is to keep the merchants informed systematically of reliable customers and to delete from the credit books those who may be unreliable. This system gives the retail merchant a certain amount of protection.

The secretary of the board was instructed to communicate with E. A. Saunders, secretary of the Maritime Board, to get a copy of the agenda.

The president, vice-president and secretary were named a committee to approach the city council to get an additional grant of \$250 to carry on work of the board on motion by Frank L. Cooper seconded by Wm. Walker.
