The announcement of Premier A. A. Dysart yesterday that John MacKenzie, of this city, has been appointed to the post of district highway engineer for York, Sunbury and Queens counties will be learned with interest. Mr. MacKenzie fills the vacancy created by the promotion of C. B. Croasdale to the post of Chief Highway Engineer, succeeding B. H. Kinghorn.

Mr. MacKenzie is popular locally and his appointment will be learned with general approval. He was born in Cape Breton, is a veteran of the World War and has been in the highway department since the year 1920. Mr. MacKenzie has held the position of resident engineer on various road contracts in the province since his connection with the department and just at present he is resident engineer on the hard-surfacing project between St. Stephen and St. Andrews. He is expected to return here early next week to commence his new duties.

MOTOR VEHICLE FEES REDUCED BY ONE HALF

Announcement by Premier A. A. Dysart
Yesterday

For Balance of 1935

Strict Enforcement of
Safety Measures
Promised

Passage of an Order-in-Council reducing all motor vehicle fees for the balance of the 1935 season by one-half the former cost was announced today by Hon. A. A. Dysart, Premier and Minister of Public Works.

The order takes effect immediately and the anticipation is that it will result in the licensing of a large number of both passenger and commercial vehicles not in service at the present time.

The Premier today further gave notice of an early inspection of all motor vehicles currently in service on the New Brunswick highways. Special attention will be given to all safety appliances, especially to brakes, lights and reflectors. Today's announcement also points to possible amendments to the regulations under the Motor Vehicle Act, designed to ensure the greater safety of the motoring public. The announcement states in part:

"Having regard to the appalling death rate incident to accidents on our public highways, a strict compliance with the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act will be required and, where deemed advisable, steps will be taken to tighten up the regulations."

Strict enforcement of that section of the Motor Vehicle Act regulating the speed and load limit of trucks is also promised. Section 37, sub-section 2, which deals with those subjects, provides that:

"Any person who operates a commercial vehicle on a highway at a greater rate of speed than thirty miles an hour, if carrying any load, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall incur a penalty of not less than ten dollars and not more than two hundred dollars and may be imprisoned for any term not exceeding sixty days, and, in addition, the driver's license of such person may be suspended by the Minister for any period not exceeding six months."

Crew Fighting Blaze

Other Recent Fires Under

One small forest fire was reported today emanating from the Muzroll Brook area of Northumberland County, where fire occurred in a Jack pine stand. Some acres of crown land were burned, but a small crew was placed at work this morning, and it is understood that the blaze is under control this afternoon.

Other fires which occurred in Gloucester County recently are now either completely out, or well under control. However, the hazard from further outbreak is always present since the weather has been warm and dry, and there have been frequent and heavy winds in recent days.

George L. Miller, chief forester, is at present on an inspection trip to various sections of the province. It is generally believed that the fire loss this summer is not as great as in the past two years.
