CHICAGO, March 11—Marjorie Hanan, 23 year old star of Sally of the Talkies, received a fan letter of particular interest to her the other day because it came from the man who fired her from an eight dollar a week job in a women's dress shop and indirectly caused her to enter radio and become the leading lady of a network program.

Marjorie now heard over an NBC-WEAF network each Sunday at 4.00 p.m. AST, as Sally Madison, star of Sally of the Talkies, had to pay her own way through dramatic school at Cincinnati. She got a job in a women's dress shop, clerking six hours a day and six days a week for eight dollars a week.

When business was bad and no customers were in the shop Marjorie practiced her ballroom dancing in the centre aisle, imagining it as the proscenium of a magnificent theatre and

Ameche, Meredith in Race Track Drama

CHICAGO, March 11—"Confederate Girl," a drama of the race track in which a young trainer (Don Ameche) buys his employer's favorite horse in a claiming race and almost loses his sweetheart (June Meredith) in consequence, will be presented during the First Nighter program over an NBC-WEAF network Friday, March 15, at 11.00 p.m., AST.

Cliff Soubier takes the role of the race horse owner. The clothes dummies in the rear as the front row of an admiring audience. MICROPHONICS

The splendid diction of De Wolf Hopper, whose robust voice as narrator of the Kansas City Philharmonic Orchestra concerts is one of the highlights of NBC's Sunday afternoon programs, is the result of his mother's careful training. When a mere lad she had him read aloud one hour a day five days a week from Milton's "Paradise Lost". Motley's "History of the Netherlands" and Plutarch's "lives".

Idiosyncrasies of NBC folks: Frank Munn won't wear anything with red in it. . . . Carlton Morse, author of "One Man's Family, won't eat sea food in any form. . . . Sigmund Romberg won't permit a vocalist to hum before going to the air. . . . Conductor Josef Koestner hates cheese. . . . Lewis James, of the Revelers, distrusts men with checkered vests. . . . And Beatrice Lillie winces when addressed by her title, Lady Peel.

NBC studio pick-ups: Countess Olga Albani carries a tiny rabbit's foot set in a gold gadget when she goes traveling. . . . Glenn Hurlburt, arranger for Tom Coakley's Palace Hotel Orchestra in San Francisco, is blind. He plots his orchestrations mentally and dictates them to an assistant to record. . . . Hal Kemp directs his band while playing the saxophone or clarinet.

Harry Reser, NBC's banjo virtuosos,

hasn't always been master of that instrument. As a boy he played the violin and it was as a pianist he began his professional career. After a period as conductor of a theatre, he took up the banjo because, in his words, "of the necessity of buying shoes for the baby".

Ted Husing To Describe Golden Gloves Finals

NEW YORK, March 11—Final bouts in the annual Golden Gloves boxing tournament—the biggest amateur fight event in the country—will be described over the WABC-Columbia network tonight from 12.15 a.m. to 1.00 A.M., AST, by Columbia's ace sports commentator, Ted Husing. The tournament wind-up will take place at Madison Square Garden.

Presented each year under the sponsorship of Paul Gallico, noted New York sports writer, Golden Gloves attracts crack amateur pugilists from all parts of the country. Heavyweight wireless operators, lightweight newsmen, middleweight theatre ushers and welterweight shipping clerks all with the ambition to be second Dempseys or Benny Leonards, add color to the events.

This year the tournament has topped all other seasons for thrills. Thus far, there have been 421 knockouts during the elimination contests.

The burnt cork broadcasts, featuring Al Bernard and Emil Casper as end men; Mario Cozzi as the singing star and Wallace Butterworth as interlocutor, have proven so popular that the sponsor has arranged to continue them over an NBC-WEAF network each Thursday night at 8.30 p.m., AST, through the spring and summer.

The Molle Merry Minstrels made their debut last October and have attracted wide attention with their modern variations of the old time plantation show.
