Donald Novis, popular tenor, has selected Noel Coward's latest composition, "Till Follow My Secret Heart," and "Am I to Blame?" as his solo numbers. Vera Van, the velvet-voiced blues songstress, will interpret in her characteristic manner the song, "Blue Moon."

Freddy Martin and his orchestra will provide the musical accompaniment to Novis and Miss Van, and Martin will play the part of the genial host of "Open House." Warren Hull, who has been seen on the musical comedy stage, will act as master-of-ceremonies and introduce such members of Martin's band as Elmer Feldkamp, baritone, singing "Did She Ask for Me?" Terry Shand, clowning crooner, and the Martinettes Trio offering "You Fit into the Picture." Special orchestrations of "Take a Number from One to Ten" and two numbers from Bing Crosby's most recent picture, "June in January" and "Love Is Just Around the Corner," will complete the program.

Valery V. Obolensky Ossinsky, Vice Chairman of the State Planning Commission of Soviet Russia, will outline "The Aim of the U.S.S.R. Second Five Year Plan" in a radio address over the WABC-Columbia network Thursday, January 3, from 3.45 to 3.00 P.M. AST. He will speak from the studios of WABC, New York.

Ossinsky, who also is a member of the U.S.S.R. Central Executive Committee and Director of the Central Economic Accounting Department, is really Prince Ossinsky, of the House of Obolensky but doesn't use the title. His father, who was a prominent newspaper publisher in Russia before the Red Revolution, was beheaded by the late Czar Nicholas because of his fight for freedom of the Russian press.

"You're the Top" hit tune from the new musical success, "Anything Goes," will serve as Loretta Lee's featured number in her program of songs with George Hall and his orchestra over the WABC-Columbia network tonight from 6.45 to 7.00 P.M. Prominent in the "Sketches" presenting authentic portraits of picturesque individuals and incidents of American life are the "Snow Village" episodes dealing with a group of characters in a small New England village. The fidelity and vividness of the characters presented have won widespread acclaim throughout New York State and New England. In addition to Arthur Allen as Uncle Dan'l Dickey and Parker Fennelly as Hiram Neville the cast will continue to feature, from time to time, Isabel Wynlock as Effie Neville, Kate McComb as Aunt Hattie, Edith Spencer as Patience Pettingill, Robert Strauss as the town ne'er-do-well Lew Pettingill, John Milton as Adinrum and Ruth Russell as Margie.

The authors of the Soconyland Sketches, Carlton and Manley, have lived extensively among the people and neighborhoods they portray. Arthur Allen is an up-state New Yorker and Parker Fennelly is a native of Maine, both men have made exhaustive studies of Maine and New England dialects and Fennelly's Down East speech is second nature to him and famous for its fidelity to the original article.
