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In Russia, under the Czars, the Jews were severely persecuted and today they are still persecuted for what reason the speaker could not clearly understand. The present treatment of the Jews in Germany is not an expression of the attitude of the people but a result of the prejudice of the leader, Hitler. The reason for the persecution has been in part that the Jews have a reputation as capitalists. The truth is that the Jews have contributed enormously to the development of world commerce. Mr. Liphshetz said that Great Britain has been the most tolerant of the Jews of all the countries and that his people had a deep appreciation of this courtesy.

Ralph Shephard spoke about the Jews of Canada and of this city in particular. It was in 1914 that the Jewish community here became strong enough to hold organized religious meetings. Since then the community has prospered, due, Mr. Shephard said, to the good-will of the citizens. There are six Jews representing the people in Canadian legislatures and the Hebrew population greatly appreciate this recognition.

E. C. Atkinson, Dr. W. H. Irvine and Dr. F. A. Wightman expressed their personal appreciation of the visit of the Jews and a vote of thanks tendered them. A vote of congratulation upon the erection of their synagogue moved by Rev. J. W. Bartlett and seconded by Walter Leslie was unanimously carried.

Exams Changes  
Are Advocated**

School Entrance examination system. He says in part:

"Every year the High Schools must be re-filled and room made in Grade 8 for those who follow. It is well known that a large number of eighth grade pupils will pass the High School Entrance Examinations. As there is no necessity of determining the relative standing of the pupils, it is my opinion that the top sixty per cent. of all eighth grades might be admitted to High Schools on their Grade Eight standing. This would be an incentive to students to do well. It would remove the nervous strain and would save time and expense in marking thousands of papers."

The suggestion of these changes, coming as they do now from the school trustee boards of Moncton and Saint John, is not a new suggestion by any means. The chief superintendent's report of three years ago shows that he had been thinking of it then and probably many years before that, but, in speaking with The Daily Mail today, he remarked that "it was very encouraging to see that the school boards were beginning to consider the matter seriously."

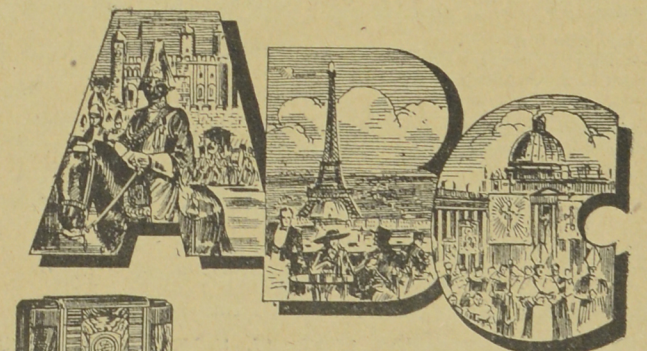
**ON INSPECTION TRIP**
