F. H. S. Wallops Saint John High School 25-3

Show Great Form in
Climbing "Big Three"
Title—McLenahan Ac-
counts for 10 Points —
Play St. Vincent's Next
Saturday.

Fredericton High School ran rough-
shod over the Saint John High fifteen
at College Field Saturday afternoon to
pile up a score of 25 against a single
unconverted try for the visitors. The
game was a crucial one and victory
for the Yellow and Black clinched the
"Big Three" Interscholastic title. Art
McLenahan, spectacular three-quarter
for the Yellow and Black, accounted
for ten of his team's twenty-five
points, making two tries and converting
two. Clark, captain of Fredericton High,
garnered six more points in the form of two tries and
Fenety, MacDonald and Markey each
accounted for one try. The sole try
for the visitors was made by Barbery,
speedy little outside three-quarter,
when he intercepted a pass and raced
about forty yards to place the ball
behind the line. The winners will meet
St. Vincent's here next Saturday in a
sudden death game for the Southern
New Brunswick Interscholastic title.

The Cass-coached team showed a
marked superiority over the Saint

John boys, and looked even better
than they did in the last two games
at Saint John and Rothesay. Although
the total score of the game indicates
a great edge in play, the first half was
very even, Fredericton having only a
slight edge. The game slowed up con-
siderably with loose scrimmages and
much dribbling by both forward
packs. The first try of the game came
shortly after the kick-off when Mc-
Lenahan grabbed the ball from the
loose on the Saint John 45-yard line
and zig-zagged his way through the
whole team. He converted his own
try from an easy angle. About ten
minutes later Clark intercepted a pass
and headed straight for between the
posts where he tallied the second try.
He failed to convert. For the remain-
der of the half the Red and Grey
pressed hard and kept the play well
in Fredericton territory. Much drib-
bling and loose scrimmages featured
the advance of the Saint John team.
Just before the half ended Barbery in-
tercepted a pass behind the F. H. S.
scrum, eluded Morgan, F. H. S. full-
back, and tallied his team's only three
points. The half ended with Saint
John fighting hard to even the count.

Saint John High seemed to weaken
a little in the second half and F. H. S.
really turned on the steam, the for-
wards carrying the ball well up the
field on dribble after dribble. Clark
again fooled the Saint John backs,
when he grabbed the ball in front of
the goal posts, faked a pass and
streaked over to make the count 11-3.
The accurate left foot of Art McLenahan
tallied the other two making it
13-3. The Yellow and Black for-
wards were running wild over the
Red and Gray clad boys from the sea-
port city. About five minutes after
Clark tallied, Fenety carried the pig-
skin over on a long run on the out-
side close to the touch line. McLenahan
failed to convert from a hard
angle. About four minutes later Mac-
Donald grabbed the ball from a mix-
up and ran ten yards through a maze
of Red and Gray jerseys to make the
score 19-3. McLenahan barely missed
gaining the other two points on a convert
when the ball struck the middle of the bar
and bounced back onto the playing field.
Shortly after McLenahan punted over
the heads of the Saint John three-
quarters, followed up, picked up his
own kick and raced in the open about
twenty yards for another try. It was
a brainy play and left the Saint John
backs dumbfounded. Clark failed
an easy convert in front of the goal
posts. Just about six minutes before
the end of the game, Mackey, speedy
wing three-quarter, received a pass
from Morgan, sped along the touch
line for twenty yards and placed the
ball in the corner for the last try of
the game. Although Fredericton High
kept right on plugging away at the
visitors, the Red and Gray put up an
excellent defence for the remainder
of the game and forced the Yellow and
Black to centre field where the game
ended.

operate more with their coaches in
trying to make better practices.

P. J. Hughes, K.C., member of the
Fredericton School Board, commended
the visitors on their excellent spirit
and remarked that football and other
athletics are great training for later
life. W. G. Quinn and R. B. VanDine,
members of the school board, also
spoke briefly. Harry Herron moved a
vote of thanks for the "A" class girls
which was replied to by Miss Boone.
