

BRIEF SITTING LIKELY FOR KING'S BENCH

Of Two Civil Cases One
Has Been Satisfac-
torily Settled

Petit Jury List

Mr. Justice LeBlanc To

The January nisi prius sittings of the Court of King's Bench for York county will take place tomorrow with Mr. Justice LeBlanc presiding. There is likelihood that the sitting will be a brief one as only one civil case is on the docket, the only other having been settled satisfactorily between the parties.

Sheriff R. W. Smith intimated this afternoon that the other case, that of Harold Porter vs the Valley Motors Co. Ltd., which resulted from an auto collision, may be settled before the petit jury list is called. If agreement is reached in this case there will be no January session tomorrow and there will be necessity of calling the petit jury panel. C. L. Doherty, of this city is clerk of the court.

N. B. FARMERS AND DAIRYMEN TO MEET HERE

Three-Day Annual Ses-
sion Begins Tomorrow
At City Hall

59th Annual Meet

Problems of Marketing,
Agricultural Education
To Be Features

The 59th annual convention of the
New Brunswick Farmers' and Dairymen's
Association will be held here
this week, commencing tomorrow
morning and lasting until Thursday
evening. The sessions will all take
place in the city Hall. Registration
of delegates, coming from all parts of
the province, will begin tomorrow
morning at nine o'clock.

The program for the three days is a
lengthy one. Besides the major con-
vention, there will be held the 16th
annual meeting of the New Brunswick
Sheep Breeders' Association, and
also the annual meeting of the New
Brunswick Fox Breeders' Association.

Edward Rice, of St. Jacques, Mada-
waska county, president of the Farm-
ers' and Dairymen's Association, is
expected here today and will preside
at the convention sessions.

Tuesday's Program

The program for tomorrow follows:
Address on "Dairying in New Bruns-
wick", by J. R. Sutherland, provincial
dairy superintendent; "The Dairy Situa-
tion in Canada", to be discussed by
J. Fingleton, chief of the division of
dairy markets and cold storage. ad-
dress on "Dairy Herd Improvement",
by H. N. Flewelling, supervisor of herd
improvement; talk on "The Value of
T. B. Testing to the Dairy Industry",
by Dr. L. A. Donovan, of Saint John;
"Marketing and Price Making", by W.
H. McEwen, manager of the Canadian
Livestock Co-Operative; "Recent De-
velopments and Accomplishment in
Agricultural Marketing", by F. W.
Walsh, director of marketing, Nova
Scotia department of agriculture;
"The Farmer's Responsibility in Solv-
ing His Marketing Problems", by J.
K. King, deputy minister of agricul-
ture for New Brunswick and chairman
of the New Brunswick Marketing
Board. All of the above is scheduled
for Tuesday morning and afternoon.
In the evening a banquet and musical
entertainment will take place with J.
A. Ford, as host. There will be ad-
dresses by Mr. Rice, Mayor W. G.
Clark, T. A. Best of Stanley, the first
vice-president; J. Q. Hall, of Fairville,
second vice-president; Hon. Lewis
Smith, Minister of Agriculture; and
Prof. A. B. MacDonald of the exten-
sion department of St. Francis Xavier
University at Antigonish. The latter
will speak on "Dependence of Agri-
culture's Progress on Agricultural
Education".

About one hundred delegates, repre-
senting almost every section in the
province, are expected to attend the ses-
sions here on Tuesday, Wednesday
and Thursday.

NEW COUNCIL SWORN

The city council for 1935 will be
sworn in this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock
with the only new face in the council
being Fred S. Mundle, who succeeded
C. L. Dougherty in Wellington ward.
His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark will
accept the office of Mayor for his ten-
th successive term. Following the
formalities of swearing-in, council will
discuss the matter of the city's nego-
tiations with the Maritime Electric
Company, Ltd., with respect to lower
rates for this city and the recent new
schedule of rates which were offered
to the city by the electric company.
Mayor Clark reported today that he
had had no further word from the
company in answer to his recent let-
ter asking further concessions.

CONDITIONS IN LUMBER WOODS ARE IMPROVED

Colder Temperature Fa-
cilitates Hauling
Operations

Snowfall Today

Operators Are Busily
Engaged, With Condi-
tions Improved

New Brunswick lumbermen are
busily engaged this week with be-
lated hauling activities and in most
portions conditions have been so
much improved by the renewed cold
spell that operations have gone for-
ward almost with a jump. Woods-
men had been practically idle dur-
ing last week's thaw.

The woods had needed cold weather
and more snow for lumbering and to-
day's snowfall, if it is general, will be
an added boon for the operators.

Mercury Dropped

The thaw conditions had become
quite serious during the latter part of
last week and in some places there
was danger of flood (especially in
many places between here and St. Ste-
phen. The sudden drop in tempera-
ture over the week-end averted what
might have been a serious flood con-
dition in many parts of the province.

Today's temperature in this city
was twenty degrees higher than yes-
terday, with a light snowfall today.

The ice in the river in this part of
