As is customary with the great Al G. Barnes Wild Animal Circus which comes to Fredericton on Friday, Aug. 2, at Queen's Square, the most beautiful aggregation of girls will appear. Especially picked from the beauties of Hollywood for their charm and figures these youngsters will delight the eye with their dancing, riding, and aerial work.

The Barnes Circus winters in California, right next door to Hollywood and every spring there are hundreds of girls, some with experience in riding and outdoor life, and others experienced in dancing and stage work,

who come to winter quarters anxious to troupe with the circus. They have heard from others who have had circus experience of the delightful outdoor life, the travel, and exercise which can only be attached to a circus. These girls go into a rigorous training for two or three months, exercising and riding. There are special trainers who show them the fine points in aerial work, some of them prefer to ride, others want acrobatic work, they are selected after a few weeks training by experts who decide just what line of circus work they are best fitted for and they concentrate accordingly.

This year there is a beautiful prelude to the circus proper, "The Fiesta of the Rio Grande," in which hundreds of these girls, more experienced performers, animals of all kinds, elephants, horses, and so on take part. The exit from the tent of the last elephant from this gigantic presentation is the signal of a fanfare of trumpets and the circus starts.

Wonderful acts from Europe will be presented: The Famous Canastrelli Troupe, The Bernetti Family of riders, The Waltiers Family, Mabel Stark the queen of tiger trainers, Captain Terrell Jacobs and his jungle-bred lions, Captain Walter McLain and his four herds of elephants, Ova Thornton world's greatest high school rider, and Bertha Matlock in her death-defying slide from the top of the huge tent backwards on a tight wire.

The circus this year travels on its own special steel railroad trains and two performances will be given at 2 P. M. and 8 P. M. The doors to the big tent will be opened an hour earlier at each performance to allow visitors to see the immense zoo and listen to the military band under the direction of Professor Charles Redrick.

Miss Sherman has made her home at Toronto for several years lately residing with Miss Hazel Palmer, also formerly of this city. Many friends here and elsewhere will regret to hear of Miss Sherman's death, although it was not unexpected.

Miss Sherman was for several years a valued member of the city school staff.

Miss Sherman is survived by two sisters, Mrs. W. B. Howard of Toronto and Mrs. Dougall Burpee of Osoyoos, B. C. The Rt. Rev. L. R. Sherman, Anglican bishop of Calgary, Alta., is a brother. Another brother, Laurie Sherman, was killed in the Great War and the late Francis J. Sherman, well known poet, and formerly one of the head officials of the Royal Bank of Canada was a brother. The funeral will take place in Toronto on Tuesday next.
