Claudette Colbert To  
Make Return Appearance on "Hollywood"

Claudette Colbert, celebrated film star who won this year's Motion Picture Academy award for the best screen performance by a woman in 1934, will pay a return guest-star visit to Dick Powell's weekly "Hollywood Hotel" program to be broadcast over WABC and the coast-to-coast Columbia network tonight from 9:00 to 10:00 P. M., A. S. T. Miss Colbert was the first guest star to appear on the full-hour dramatic musical revue when it was inaugurated last October.

She will preview scenes from the first picture she has made since winning the award — "She Married Her Boss". Melvyn Douglas, well known leading man of stage and screen who plays opposite her in the new picture will also support Miss Colbert in the condensed radio version. They will be introduced to the radio audience by Louella Parsons, movie columnist.

The musical portion of the broadcast will feature currently popular tunes in contrast with last week's musical feature, "The Student Prince".

Dick Powell will introduce a new novelty number, entitled "My Very Good Friend, the Milk Man"; also "You're An Angel" and selections from one of his newest pictures. Frances Langford will sing "Every Little Moment" and "Then You've Never

A quartet on the radio and off, together everywhere—at church, the movies, dances and sometimes even meals. Such a quartet is the Brunswick Singers, popular male group heard each Friday over the Canadian Radio Commission's eastern network at 8:30 P. M., A. S. T., with Bruce E. Holder's Orchestra on "Fundy Fantasy" programs from Saint John, N. B. Such a thing as petty jealousies are unknown to the four who believe that they form one of the most contented squares of singers anywhere—and they don't care where.

Two Scotsmen, an American, and a native New Brunswicker comprise the quartet which was formed in July, 1933, as an adjunct to the Male Choral Club of Saint John and which has twice been heard over the national network of the Canadian Radio Commission.

After chasing them in a body, in pairs and singly for two weeks, the CRC stogee down Fundy way managed to collar them all one night during rehearsal. He went into a huddle with them and emerged a half hour later, after strenuous pumping, with the following information.

Bernard C. Bean, first tenor of the "Been Blue", from her own starring picture, "Every Night At Eight".

Anne Jamison, Powell's leading lady on the program goes back to Victor Herbert's "Naughty Marietta" for the ever-popular Ah, Sweet Mystery of Life. Igor Gorin, romantic Viennese baritone and a recent addition to the cast, will be heard in several classic surprises in the way of special orchestral novelties and arrangements.

group, was born in Boston of Canadian parents and possesses a sweet lyric voice. As a youth he commenced public singing in the tenor section of Germain Street Baptist Church choir in the mixed choir of Charlotte Street Baptist Church, West Saint John. He is a charter member of the Saint John Male Choral Club in which he is a tenor soloist. He was also

heard on the Commission's "Show Shop Songs" octet on Monday nights. Albert E. Stafford, second tenor, is also a member of the Choral Club. Born in Marysville, near Fredericton, N. B., of English parents, he received his earliest musical training like hundreds of others, in pianoforte. He has a tenor voice of pure quality and

for many years was soloist at Queen Square United Church.

David Thomson, baritone, director and secretary of the organization, was born in Scotland, and is a nephew of Sir Hugh S. Robertson eminent Scottish composer and conductor of the Glasgow Orpheus Choir. At the age of eight, in Scotland, he commenced his musical training in pianoforte and theory. He has composed several part songs for male voices and has a number of interesting arrangements to his credit. The composition which has attracted most attention his way is that to Joyce Kilmer's famous poem "Trees", and his most popular arrangement has been a male setting to the old nursery rhyme "Three Blind Mice".

H. Graeme Allwood, basso, fourth member of the quartet is also a Scot. He is a son of the late T. H. Allwood, A. R. C. O., founder and first conductor of the Saint John Male Choral Club. He is but 22 years of age and possesses a remarkably strong bass voice. He made his debut before Commission makes at the age of 19 and audiences who have heard The Brunswick Singers are invariably impressed with such a deep voice in one so young. A listener was once privileged to meet the quartet following a broadcast and remarked that he had expected to find Mr. Allwood a huge man, whereas, in reality, he weighs no more than 135 pounds.

Besides their contracts with the Commission and the Male Choral Club of Saint John The Brunswick Singers are the official quartet of Central Baptist and the Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club.

"FACT A DAY"  
PROGRAMME HAS  
WIDE COVERAGE

"A Fact a Day About Canada", the interesting daily items about Canada which for the past year has been broadcast by the Canadian Radio Commission through the co-operation of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics is to have a place in the fifty ship-board newspapers published by the Cunard-White Star line for the information of its passengers. Mr. Alexander Patterson of the Cunard-White Star Line was attracted by the character of these broadcast items about Canada and applied to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics for permission to incorporate them in the ship newspapers.

The "Fact a Day" items are attracting attention in other important quarters. Premier Tilley of New Brunswick interested himself in having the monthly booklets containing these broadcasts placed on file in the library of the New Brunswick legislature.

For the balance of the summer the "Fact About Canada" item will be broadcast only four days a week instead of seven. It will be heard on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, and Sundays. This change is made in order that the Radio Commission may co-operate with the Dominion Travel Bureau by broadcasting interesting items about the tourist and vacation attractions of Canada. These broadcasts will be heard during the new period on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

National Spot For  
CRCM Cello Quartet

Rubin Krasner's well known cello quartet, which has delighted an eastern audience of the Canadian Radio Commission during past months, is now occupying a national spot and will be heard in future over all Commission stations from 11:15 to 11:30 P. M., A. S. T., each Sunday night.

This change in the program schedule of CRCM (Montreal) has been prompted by the many letters of appreciation received from people throughout eastern Canada, to whom the cello quartet has become an established feature, and was made as a result of insistent demands from listeners in other parts of the Dominion.

The program, "Echoes From The King's Court", which formerly occupied this period, is now coupled with the "Lyric Trio" series heard over the coast-to-coast network each Sunday from 7:30 to 8:00 P. M., A. S. T.

"There'll be plenty of listeners today", remarked Jack Fulton to his orchestra as they prepared to broadcast the other morning, over CBS. "It is raining all over the East and Middle West and folks will stay at home", he added. Fulton, an aviation enthusiast and pilot, listens in daily to the Government's broadcast of weather conditions for the guidance of airmen.

If you should suddenly come upon Barry McKinley, youthful baritone and Agnes Moorehead, radio actress with bows and arrows in their hands, don't think they're copying Robin Hood. For the two stars of Camay Soap's "Dreams Come True" programs on the NBC red network, are taking up archery in a big way to compete in eastern tournaments later in the summer.

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
