

## OPENING DATES N. B. HUNTING SEASON NEAR

Deer and Bear Season  
From Sept. 15 to Nov.  
30 Inclusive

### 6-Point Law Applies

Minister of Lands and  
Mines Declares Open  
Partridge Season

Shortening days and cool nights bring thoughts of the hunting season to the fore in the minds of many New Brunswickers.

In preparation for the annual exodus of city dwellers to the forest lands for big game and to the alder swales and birch woods for partridge and woodcock, the Chief Game Warden's Office of the Department of Lands and Mines has already undertaken the distribution of licenses to the numerous vendors throughout the Province.

The earliest phase of the hunting season is that during which only deer and bear may be hunted. The open season for both these animals opens on September 15th and extends until November 30th. Through the fact that the 15th falls on a Sunday this year, the season will not actually open until the following day, Monday, September 16th. An exception in the Game Act to the general open season is made providing for the islands of the Grand Manan group. It reads:

"On the islands of Grand Manan, Campobello and Deer Island, Charlotte County, bona fide residents are allowed to kill ONE deer (as contrasted with two in other sections) during the open season, October 15th to November 15th."

### Kill One Bull Moose

A month's open season during which hunters will be permitted to kill one bull moose has again been declared between the dates of October 20th to November 20th. The six-point law will again apply.

After due consideration, F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines, has decided in favor of an open partridge season to run from October 1st to 15th inclusive. The Minister's decision is based on favorable reports received from guides and from game wardens in all sections of the Province.

As has been the case in former years, the open partridge season will apply only to those varieties known as ruffed grouse and spruce partridge. Hungarian or European grey partridge which have been liberated in considerable numbers during the past several years by interested sportsmen and by members of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association, are still protected.

A similar restriction applies to pheasants. Two varieties of this species, the English ring-neck and the Mongolian, now quite common in New Brunswick, are under year-round protection.

The woodcock season this year will run from October 1st to November 30th. Ducks, geese and brant may be shot from September 15th to December 31st; and on the islands of the Grand Manan group from October 15th until January 31st.

## ATTENDANCE AT FAIR LARGEST SINCE YEAR 1923

At noon the young farmers were the guests at luncheon at the Experimental Station and this afternoon they were taken for an auto drive about the city and in Marysville. These young people come from various parts of York, Carleton, Queens, Sunbury and Madawaska counties.

Judging was carried on in sheep and swine today, being held over from yesterday in order to have the boys and girls club members present. The judging competitions were carried on today at the judging ring.

The million and one exhibits in the main building continued to attract the interest of the great number of people who thronged into the building yesterday and last night.

## SUPPORT IDEA OF PER PATIENTS ALLOWANCE IN N.B.

The New Brunswick Hospital Association passed a resolution this morning supporting the recommendation that the provincial government change the system of providing grants to hospitals in this province. At the present time the practice is to give lump sums. The Hospital Association understands that the New Brunswick Union of Municipalities support the idea of allowances per patients of twenty-five cents, rather than the lump sum donations, and this morning went on record as supporting the Union of Municipalities if it passes a resolution in this connection at its convention next month.

## PROV. HOSPITAL ACT WILL BE CONSIDERED

New Brunswick Hospital  
Ass'n Concludes  
This Afternoon

### Premier to be Present

All Officers Re-elected  
At This Morning's  
Session

The New Brunswick Hospital Association which is holding its seventh annual meeting in this city this week, will conclude this afternoon, considerable routine work being on the agenda as well as a discussion on the Provincial Hospital Act.

It is expected that there will be lively discussion on the Hospital Act and representatives of medical societies are expected to be present, as well as Premier A. A. Dysart, and Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Health and Labor for this province, who also is honorary president of the provincial Hospital Association.

At a lengthy meeting this morning the full slate of officers was re-elected and Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts was elected honorary president. George Gilbert, K. C., of Bathurst is president; Percy Burchill, of South Nelson, is vice-president; and Fred I. Haviland of this city is secretary-treasurer.

Dr. William Warwick, of this city, district medical health officer, delivered an address this morning his subject hospital grants and hospital reports to the government. This was followed by a round-table conference. The meeting adjourned at the noon-hour for luncheon. This afternoon there will be consideration of communications from the New Brunswick Medical Society, the New Brunswick Association of Registered Nurses and other communications dealing with Hospital Legislation, also consideration.

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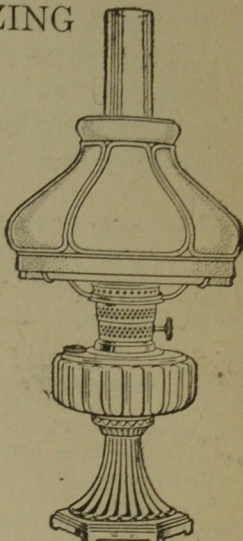
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
