STILL AT LARGE THE MURDERER

Restigouche Man Was Found Murdered Three Weeks Ago

Mounted Police Have Not. Yet. Found. the Slightest Clue to the Murderer.

(Special to The Daily Mail)

BATHURST, N. B., June 12-No clue has yet been found by R.C. M.P. into the death of Patrick Dempsey, age 24, who was found murdered three weeks ago, In other words the R.C.M.P. have not yet "got their man," although they are making every

Dempsey was shot in the back and in the back of the head with what police believe were .22 calibre buliets. Patrick Dempsey, 24 years old, of Becketville, five miles back of Jacquet River, was found dead near Becketville settlement by two boys. He had been dead four or five days, police believe. Dempsey was unmarried.

In spite of an intensive search of the area in which the body was found, Royal Canadian Mounted Police failed to locate any rifle shells. The heavy ground covering of leaves and grass made the search difficult. When discovered the young man's cap was RHODES SEEKS clutched tightly in his hand. EDMONTON, Alta., June 12-Possibly the strangest provincial election in the history of Canada will be seen in Alberta early in July when six political parties will ask the electors to vote for their candidates.

The United Farmers of Alberta will seek re-election against the Conservative, Liberal, Social Credit, Labor and Communist candidates, to say nothing of several independents.

The major fly in the political ointment for the U.F.A. appears at present to be Social Credit, the party of William Aberhart, preaching school teacher, of Calgary. Nobody appears to know just what Mr. Aberhart proposes to do if he becomes premier, beyond the stated possibility of a \$25 a month basis dividend for every audult in the province, but it is beyond question that Social Credit has a great many thousand

The U.F.A. government has Major C. H. Douglas, British economist and founder of Social Credit, in Edmonton at the present time-at a cost for of \$100 a day to the taxpayers—but what will be the Major's findings as to the possibilities for a Social Credit scheme in Alberta remain to be heard. Major Douglas is expected to give some kind of a report in

MIGHT CLUBS ARE SHOCKING, TOURIST PASTORS SAY AS THEY VISIT DENVER'S "HOT SPOTS" hall.

DENVER, Colo., June 12-Two Methodist ministers, the Rev. F. C. Sager, of Edgewater, Colo., and the Rev. Albert C. Hoover, of Denver, made the rounds of Denver's night clubs and found conditions "shocking." They were accompanied by detectives, who showed them all of the "hottest" spots in the city, and reported to the local Methodist Episcopal Ministers' Association:

"The present situation with relation to liquor is worse than in the days of the old-time saloon, and it is infinitely worse than it was during prohibition Bootlegging continues to thrive, there is more drinking, more crime, more vice and debauchery."

Between 35 and 40 establishments, most of them in the downtown business district, were included in the tour. Concerning houses of ill repute in Denver, they said:

"The old redlight district was about as commendable from the standpoint of control of this situation as any of the present methods which are
