Cornelia Otis Skinner Succeeds Winchell On N. B. C. Network

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 11—Few performers in the entertainment world are so dependent on their own resources as Cornelia Otis Skinner, the actress and monologist, who has just begun a Summer radio series. Each step in the making of the programs, from the idea for each sketch to the actual broadcast every Sunday over an NBC-WJZ network at 9:30 P. M., A. S. T., is the result of her own work and talent.

"The technique of monologue", Miss Skinner declares, "both in writing and acting, differs considerably from the technique of the play. The monologist should be his own playwright. In a play, an actor can afford to waste lines, knowing he can redeem himself in another act. The character sketch, however, must be rendered with almost microphone perfection or it fails utterly."

"There can be no lines without significance. In writing, therefore, the monologist will never burden himself with lines he cannot speak with conviction. Knowing his own

In addition to her comedy, Miss Brice may sing a chorus or two of "Rose of Washington Square" the popular ballad with which she has become identified. As usual, Lee Perrin's orchestra and the Cavaliers Quartet will round out the musical portion of the program.

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
