City Council Had Busy Meeting

Possibility of Granting of Franchise to Hygienic Garbage Company for Exclusive Refuse Gathering—Matters of Limiting Market Days, Peddling to Homes, Parking, Discussed—Mayor Clark Presides.

The city council in its November committee meeting in the mayor's office of the city hall, discussed a number of matters of importance including a prospective granting of a garbage franchise to the Hygienic Garbage Company; the ever-recurring problem of market days and peddling from door to door by the farmers which has once again been protested against; confusion in the parking problem at Phoenix Square because of the habit of farmers in coming to the city the day prior to marketing their goods and taking up all the available room; and several other matters.

Mayor Clark presided at the meeting. Aldermen present were Hedley Forbes, G. Willard Kitchen, Ivan McKnight, F. S. Mundle, Warren Maxwell, T. E. Doohan, David McCaughey, Dr. H. S. Wright, Moses Mitchell, H. Ralph Gunter.

E. Allison MacKay, representing Jack Kileen, president of the Hygienic Garbage Company, appeared, and asked certain concessions for his client respecting exclusive permission to collect garbage in the city. If given such a "franchise" Mr. Kileen would like protection for his business. Mr. MacKay explained that the city's new dump site makes it more difficult for Mr. Kileen to carry on his business, since the new site is 1.7 miles below his nearest customer. It means

that the Hygienic Garbage Company must travel almost three miles. Mr. MacKay asked that Mr. Kileen be given permission to use the new dump and also suggested a contract between the city and the garbage company whereby Mr. Kileen would get such an exclusive right to collect garbage in the city. The point was made that the Hygienic Garbage Company does good service in the city.

Mayor Clark said that the company might be given a franchise like the bus franchise. "There is much in the idea," he said, "and it might be more economical."

Ald. Mitchell suggested that Mr. MacKay and the city solicitor get together on this matter.

A motion made by Ald. Mundle and seconded by Ald. David McCaughey left the matter in the hands of a committee composed of Ald. Mundle, McCaughey and Maxwell to interview Messrs. MacKay and P. J. Hughes, K.C., and report back to the council.

A petition from the butchers and grocers of the city, signed by a number of merchants of each class, was read by His Worship Mayor Clark. The petition asked that "market days be limited to two days a week and also that house to house peddling be stopped." The signers complained they had not been able to give the citizens proper service.

Mayor Clark noted that there was no special by-law covering market days, although the custom was for Wednesdays and Saturdays to be market days. The present regulations cite "sunrise to sunset" as the time for market.

As to the complaint that farmers sold beef and meats generally or less than quarters be looked into by the police; no farmer should sell his meats by the pound.

Ald. Kitchen pointed out that there always had been conflict between the merchants and farmers over the matter.

He said there was confusion respecting parking at Phoenix Square because of farmers arriving the day prior to market day. Oftentimes a merchant could not park because the parking space at Phoenix Square—a public parking space—was all taken up.

"It is not reasonable for farmers to come to market the day previous to market day, as is practised now," stated Mayor Clark.

Ald. Kitchen said it was not fair for the merchants to be penalized because of farmers peddling to the citizen's homes. There are two sides of the question, of course, and the farmer gives considerable business to the merchants here. But they also take business away.

Mayor Clark said there was no reason for limiting the number of market days, but there was no call for farmers arriving on the previous day and taking possession of the market place, excluding parking.

On the suggestion of Ald. Mundle, the matter was left to the City Hall and Market committee to look into.

A request from J. J. F. Winslow, K.C., representing the Highway Transit Ltd., asked for a license to operate a taxi service between Fredericton and Marysville with terminus in this city and possibly to go as far as Oromocto. The council was uncertain if the city can grant such license under the regulations, and it was planned to get a ruling from the city solicitor on it.

A. A. Colter of this city reported through a letter of a drain across his property which, he said, had reacted against his yearly crop on that particular piece of land. He had received no benefit from his crop each year because of this unruly drain. The matter was left to City Engineer MacKay who will report to Mr. Colter that the drain is on C.P.R. property and not within the jurisdiction of the city.

There was slight discussion on the city market scales and a suggestion was made that charges be made for weighing in an endeavor to pay the price of the scales. It would bring in a certain revenue.

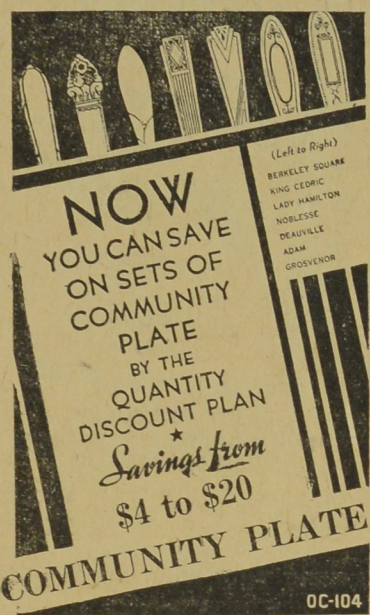
