## Change Whole System of Rural Phones

difficulties of the new system is that the code-ring system is introduced, which means that instead of the telephone ringing whenever some party on the same line wants a connection, as you often hear in country homes, the new system means that when one subscriber rings his telephone for the call every subscriber on the whole system hears the ring. Last evening while The Daily Mail representative was speaking on the telephone to a party down river the conversation was interrupted twice by the ringing of telephone bells. This should make a merry old jingle in all the houses in this section of York county which are fortunate—or unfortunate—enough to be connected up with the telephone. While it is claimed that there will be more satisfactory talking service over the circuit the phones will continue to ring more than ever. While the element of noise will continue to be worse in the winter it is said that it will be no worse than it was under the previous system. The only addition will be the bells.

It is estimated that the cost of changing the system to the code-ring system will run into several thousand dollars and that between three and four hundred telephones will have to be changed. The residents of Lincoln who are "up in arms" at the change are talking of interviewing the government, and have taken the matter up with the Public Utilities Commission. But it is difficult to see what can be done in regard to the unfortunate situation when expert electrical engineers claim that they have found the only solution of the difficulty, and at the same time the difficulty does not seem to be eliminated.

others, and that a report could be made later into the matter. There is a possibility that a special meeting of the council may be called to deal more conclusively with this problem.

There was discussion on the possibility of the erection of a factory for hardware flooring in central New Brunswick. A letter was received from W. J. Scott of this city pointing out the advantage of having the factory here and that its probable location would be somewhere in the vicinity off Waterloo Row. The Council will consider the matter of a fixed assessment. Mr. Scott intimated that local labor would be employed exclusively.

There was intimation to the council by letter that an Upper Canada concern is considering the manufacture of excelsior here also, which would be used for export to England. No further details have been learned but it is expected that local labor would be employed if such a factory was built here.
