

PROSPECTS OF FINE HUNTING IN NOVEMBER

C. N. R. Arranging Excursion to Maritimes November 5

3 Days in Woods

Sportsmen to Have Another Month of Good Sport is Predicted

Forecasts of woodland and weather conditions for November indicate that sportsmen will have another month to enjoy the big game hunting for which the Province of New Brunswick has become famous. With the coming of colder weather, the moose and deer have abandoned the watercourses and are now to be found along the hardwood ridges. Favorable reports from guides and outfitters are being received daily by D. W. Griffiths, director of the New Brunswick Government Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel here.

From Upper Canada

In order that sportsmen in the Montreal area may take advantage of this opportunity for big game hunting, the Canadian National Railways are arranging two excursion trains which will leave Bonaventure Station on Friday, November 15th. The first of these will leave at 12:00 o'clock noon and the other at 8:00 p.m., the same evening.

The excursion will operate from Montreal to points in eastern Quebec, the Gaspé Peninsula and Maritime points as far east as Sydney, Nova Scotia. Those leaving Montreal at noon, Friday, November 15th, may be in the New Brunswick woods before Saturday noon. Hunters travelling on the second train will arrive in New Brunswick early Saturday afternoon. Sunday hunting in this province is prohibited by law but sportsmen have until the evening of Tuesday, November 19th, before entraining for home.

The expectation is that the ten-dollar non-resident deer and bear license, instituted by New Brunswick this fall, will be favored by many of the short-stay hunters who take advantage of the coming excursion.

At last night's committee meeting of the city council during the passage of a bill from a local restaurant for meals for relief camp workers, it was noted by the council that "transients" were more frequent in recent weeks than for some months. The bill for meals is an excessive one. The problem is likely to be discussed more fully at a later date by the council.

LEASE IS RENEWED

Renewal of his lease for ten years at a yearly rental of \$550 was granted to Roy Sutherland, proprietor of a garage on Carleton street, by the city council at its committee meeting last evening. Mr. Sutherland's request was a ten year lease at \$500. The council decided that a yearly rental of \$550 was a reasonable figure since it had previously been \$500. The present lease at this price expires in 1938. Ald. Mitchell moved the renewal of the lease, seconded by Ald. F. S. Mundle.

EXPRESS RATES DISCUSSED

Yesterday afternoon the Board of Trade office in this city was visited by F. M. Smith, superintendent of the C. N. R. at Moncton; G. E. Bellerose, general manager of the C. N. R., and F. N. Wiggins, general superintendent. A. O. I. Cruikshank of the C.N.R., W. W. Hubbard, president of the Fredericton Board of Trade, and S. S. Miller, vice-president, also A. Murray, secretary, were present. A lengthy discussion regarding express rates to points in the province, the North Shore and Nova Scotia. Although the meeting was an impromptu one, there was interesting discussion in connection with express rates.

CLAIMS CITY HIGH-HATTING NEW INDUSTRY

Ald. F. S. Mundle Outspoken for Development New Industries

Lack Industries Here

Abattoir, Hardware, Excelsior Factories are "Knocking at Door"

Fredericton's city council heard last night from Ald. Fred S. Mundle that there are "three industries knocking at our doors, and 'we are high-hatting them."

Ald. Mundle was outspokenly in favor of the encouragement of such industries and claimed that a committee should be appointed from the council to encourage industries to come to the city of Fredericton.

"Queen Street has been going down because we haven't industries enough in the back sections of the city. The Board of Trade should be a little more-wide-awake in this connection."

Ald. Mundle referred especially to letters from W. J. Scott of this city, and from an Upper Canada concern, the latter of which has a feeler for the erection of an "excelsior" plant in the capital. Mr. Scott has plans of erecting a hardware flooring plant in the city. Both would employ local labor.

The third industry is the public abattoir which has been before the council for some time, site for which is still unsettled, because of agitation by the citizens over what they deem will be offensive odors.

The Daily Mail has strongly supported the move to have an abattoir in this city.

The abattoir committee of the council had picked on the exhibition grounds as a place suitable for the York county abattoir. Ald. Mundle, as chairman of the committee read a letter from Peter Nugard, one of the sponsors of the abattoir, read a letter from Mr. Nugard last evening in which the latter stated that the residents in the vicinity of the exhibition grounds and the west end of the city disapproved of the site there and would probably send out petitions against it. A delay in plans for erection of the building had been caused by this "controversy", stated Mr. Nugard's letter.

The council debated the matter of the abattoir at some length, and various was the opinion. Ald. Moses Mitchell said that opposition would be strong if attempts were made to erect the abattoir on the exhibition grounds. He advised looking for a more suitable location. Ald. David McCaughey suggested a site near the Dominion Experimental Station.

Ald. Mitchell believed it would depreciate the value of the buildings in the exhibition grounds area, although Ald. Mundle assured him that there were no buildings within from one to two hundred yards and there was no offensive odor from an abattoir building at that distance.

"We mustn't have petty arguments about it", he said, "We need the industry". His Worship Mayor Clark agreed on this point, and declared that at the recent municipal-provincial conference here that one of the most significant things brought up was 'that something should be done to develop public works'.

Ald. David McCaughey, suggested the Dominion Experimental Station as a logical site, and Ald. Moses Mitchell believed that the Hanwell Road offered a better place for an abattoir.

Ald. Dr. H. S. Wright wondered if Mr. Nugard would consider the Experimental Station as a site. Ald. Mitchell warned that if the exhibition grounds was chosen there would in all likelihood be an innuendo at once. Mayor Clark said that the Experimental Station site would be looked into, also

CHANGE WHOLE SYSTEM OF RURAL PHONES

Makes Change to Eliminate Prevalent Noise

Complaints Made

Increased Voltage Cause—Whole District Affected

The New Brunswick Telephone Company, Ltd., has started in to change its whole system of rural telephones in this district. The first movement in connection with the change, was made yesterday when new telephones were installed between this city and Lincoln on both its lines running into that section. This line will be extended on to Burton and will also take in the opposite side of the river through Mauderville and Sheffield. The Royal Road and the Nashwaak sections will likewise be changed.

Speaking to The Daily Mail today A. J. Thompson, local manager for this district, said the changes have been made necessary due to induction from increased voltage on the power company's electric line, making telephones so noisy that it is almost impossible to hear over them. The change while it is the best that the engineers could figure out, it is claimed it will not do much to eliminate the noise, and it is said that the noise will be worse in the winter than it has been in the summer. All of which is not very encouraging to telephone users on the new line. The fact of the matter is that the telephone subscribers down through Lincoln are putting up considerable "kick."
