MAKE SILVER CAKE FOR JUBILEE HOLIDAY

Help Family Remember Great King's Work By Special Touches

Republicans, democrats, communists, monarchists — people of every political faith the whole world over, will pause on May 6th, to mark the silver anniversary of a great King, George V., of England, and his gracious Queen. His Jubilee should be a day set apart, marked in the memory of everyone for a man who has handled well a superman's task. Even those who want to stay quietly at home can emphasize the anniversary for the family, particularly the younger members.

Silver cake is a tradition for twenty-fifth anniversaries and is a splendid finale to a delicious May Day dinner. The one suggested here is exceptionally light and of fine texture. It goes well, too, with a refreshing dessert for fresh fruit moulded in a good jelly powder.

SILVER CAKE

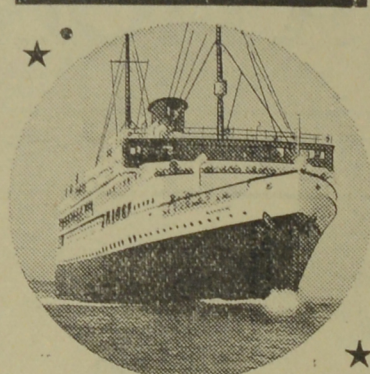
3 cups sifted cake flour
1 1-2 cups sugar

3 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup milk
1-2 cup butter or other shortening
1-2 teaspoon lemon extract
4 egg whites, stiffly beaten
Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add flour, alternately milk, a small amount to a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add lemon extract. Fold in egg whites quickly and thoroughly. Bake in two greased 9-inch layer pans in moderate oven (375 degrees Fahrenheit) 25 to 30 minutes. Spread Snowy Lemon Frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake.

SNOWY LEMON FROSTING

2 egg whites, unbeaten
3 tablespoons water
1 1-2 cups sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1-4 teaspoon grated lemon rind
Combine egg whites, sugar, water, and lemon juice, in top of double boiler beating with rotary egg beater

until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water beat constantly with rotary egg beater, and cook 7 minutes or until frosting will stand in peaks. Remove from boiling water and beat until thick enough to spread. Add lemon rind and spread. Makes enough frosting to cover tops and sides of two 9-inch layers generously.

KING'S JUBILEE FURNISHES FARE FOR THE FILMS

Britain's forthcoming celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of King George's reign finds the movies prepared to do their part in recalling to the world the significant and historic events which have occurred in England, or with which the reign of the King has been associated, since he succeeded Edward VII on the throne. Already American moviegoers have been viewing compilations of old news reels which have again brought to view some of the scenes in which George V has participated and before the Jubilee begins next month many more of these pictures of the past will be brought to light.

A real newsreel never goes to waste and as long as it is possible to utilize it there is always the likelihood that some day it may again be shown to audiences who have merely read of such scenes as it depicts and in which the viewers' parents possibly had a part.

The reign of King George is so rich in the variety of its incidents and the importance of the events in which he, or the British Empire, has had a part that anything like a complete motion picture record of his reign would take days to exhibit. One can only imagine what an extensive amount of film has been utilized by the cameramen in shooting the royal ceremonies in which he has figured, the sporting events he has attended, the openings of Parliament, the recreations of the royal family, the comings and goings of the King and Queen, their attendance at this or that function, not to mention the millions of feet of film devoted to the part Britain played in the World War. Probably no other ruler not even excepting Presidents of the United States, who in the case of recent occupants of that office have been the subject of many screenings, has been caught more often in the newsreels than this highly popular monarch.

ORDER OF GARTER MAY ADMIT WOMEN INTO ITS RANKS

LONDON, May 1—When the Chapter of the Most Noble Order of the Garter—the premier Order of English chivalry—meets at Windsor in June the admission of women to Companionship may be one of the most important questions before it.

This will be the first time a Chapter has been held since 1913.

The Queen, as Lady of the Order, is at present, the only woman permitted to wear the jewel, the George, and the broad ribbon denoting the oldest order in the world.

The Order was established by King Edward the Third, in 1348, and at present consists of the King, the Prince of Wales, the immediate members of the Royal Family, and 25 Knights.

Dames Were Admitted

During the 14th and 15th centuries however, women were regularly admitted to the Order.

The Queen, the daughters of the King, the wives and daughters of Knights and other women of exalted position were known as Dames of the Fraternity of St. George.

Between the reigns of Edward the Third and Henry the Seventh the Royal Wardrobe accounts contain several entries of the delivery of robes and garters to women. The first woman so mentioned was Isabel, Countess of Bedford, and the last were the Princesses Margaret and Elizabeth, two daughters of Henry the Seventh.

The ladies of Margaret Byron, wife of Sir Robert Harcourt, K. G., who lived in the time of Henry the Sixth, and of Alice, Duchess of Suffolk, in the days of Edward the Fourth, are both shown with the Garter on the left arm.

Their Present Honours

The only Orders to which women are admitted, at present, are the Order of the British Empire, the Order of the Companions of Honour, and the Imperial Order of the Crown of India, the latter being for women only.

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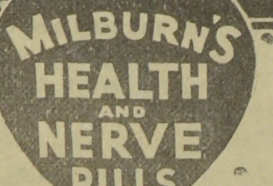
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
