V. Whitney's Today, winner of the Wood Memorial at Jamaica on Saturday.

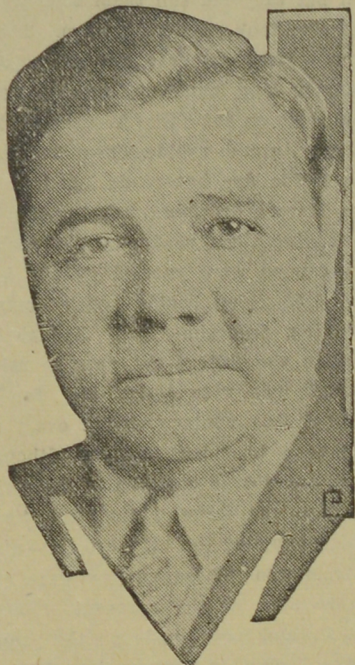

Brooklyn Dodgers Rout Giants Winning Streak As 17,000 Hoot Terry and His Men and Toss Firecrackers at Them.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 30—Those amazing Brooklyn Dodgers, still mesmerized by the spell of Casey Stengel, picked right up today where they left off picking on the Giants last year—crushing the New Yorkers 12-5 at Ebbett Field in the first renewal this season of the interborough warfare that knocked the Giants out of the 1934 pennant.

A loud and raucous 17,000 turned out in the finest Brooklyn tradition, hooting the enemy, tossing fire-crackers at them, howling continuously at their personal foes — Bill Terry, Giants' manager and Dick Bartell.

Terry, who made that "crack" about Brooklyn, still being in the league, escaped unscathed as Lefty Watson Clark, Giant cast-off, won his third victory of the season, busting the Giants' string of seven straight conquests, but Bartell had a fearful day.

With everything calm and orderly after yesterday's pugilistic encounter that caused the suspension of two players, the Cubs shut out Pittsburgh 3-0 at Chicago for their sixth victory in seven starts.

Young Gene Scholl, only hometown lad with Cincinnati Reds, pitched his first full game as a major leaguer today, and led his mates to a crushing 12-2 victory over St. Louis Cardinals.

LONDON, May 1—Twelve thousand spectators saw Hamilton Tigers defeat England in a recent hockey match at Wembley.

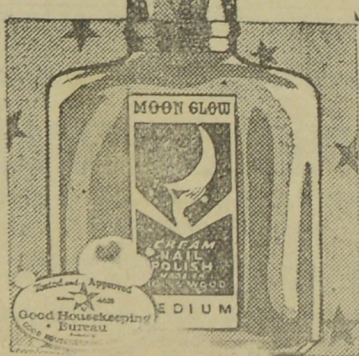
