Louis Prima, a 21-year-old Italian-American, hails from New Orleans, where his scorching brand of trumpet playing has been a favorite for several seasons. He was brought to New York last year to make records, which soon became "best sellers". The other members of the quintet are "Pee Wee" Russell of St. Louis, clarinetist; Gary McAdams of Boston, guitarist; John

Frank Munn, who hasn't missed a week over the air for 11 years, is the dark-haired, blue-eyed Irish tenor who claims that there are a hundred listeners for "Mother Machree" to one for the latest song hit.

Miss Monroe played the leading roles in "The First Little Show" on Broadway and appeared in star roles for the St. Louis and Chicago Opera Companies.

Broadcasts You May Never Hear

Have you ever heard a radio broadcast by a man sealed inside a huge block of ice? Or from a lady being "sawed in half" by a magician? Or by a chronic back-seat driver, broadcasting direct from the tonneau?

Every day the Public Events and Special Features department of the Columbia Broadcasting System receives and welcomes letters bearing suggestions—even demands—for novel broadcasts. Many of the suggestions are sound enough. Many of them, in fact, are used. But plenty are not feasible.

The use of lapel microphones in Columbia's "man-on-the-street" broadcasts has even inspired a novel "man-on-a-horse" idea. One correspondent recommended that CBS arrange to have a lapel mike on the jockey aboard a horse in the Kentucky Derby. He specifically suggested, however, that the mike should be "on the winning horse" and that the rider describe the race from start to finish. He did not offer odds as to which horse would win.

Among the other suggestions received by Paul W. White, who heads the CBS events department, are the following:

A broadcast from inside a spiritualistic medium's cabinet during a seance, with the actual voice of some famous person in history "coming through from the beyond".

A description of his flight through the air by Hugo Zucchini as he is being fired out of a cannon in the circus.

A broadcast by a "G" man with a

lapel microphone during a raid on a gangster hide-out.

A lapel microphone broadcast by a man being hypnotized.

A broadcast by a patient on an operating table.

A broadcast by a window-washer at work on the 80th floor of the Empire State Building.

A broadcast by a man in a barber chair, describing how it feels to have a double shampoo, with the babbling of the barber in the background.

A broadcast by a high-diver, wearing a lapel mike and describing his 150-foot jump as he falls.

A broadcast from a baseball game in which each player would wear a lapel microphone and, as the correspondent suggested, "would be able to talk to each other", or the umpire.

Perhaps the strangest offer was made by a young man who tried to sell CBS "exclusive rights to broadcast a revolution I am going to start in Central America".

Baseball's dream game is still the same haunting nightmare—for the National League.

For the third successive time the shooting stars of the baseball firmament gathered to outline each other before a huge assemblage of close to 70,000 spectators today and again the brilliants of the American League eclipsed those of the National.

The score was 4-1, one run better than the winning margins produced by the younger circuit in the first two dream games.

A towering man from the American League's second division, Jimmy Foxx of Philadelphia Athletics, and Vernon "Lefty" Gomez of the New York Yankee pitching corps, were the two who sent the Nationals reeling and helpless into defeat.

TORONTO, Ont., July 9—Either two weeks before his battle with King Levinsky in Chicago August 7 or two weeks after, Joe Louis, sensational Negro heavyweight, will fight in Toronto, Playfair Brown, sports promoter, announced yesterday.

An opponent will be named by Brown, and although no announcement has been made, Hans Birkie, German heavyweight, has been mentioned as a possible opponent for the brown bomber.

\$25,000 BID FOR MATCH

LOS ANGELES, California, July 9—A singles match for a purse of \$25,000 was offered to Mrs. Helen Willis Moody and Miss Helen Jacobs as a result of the Wimbledon final in which Mrs. Moody defeated her California rival.

The offer was cabled to London by Harry Myers, secretary of the Los Angeles County Council of the American Legion.

Myers said the matter of distributing the purse would be up to the stars. He said they could make it a "60-40" proposition or winner take all, as they saw fit.
