Roy Locksley Guest Conductor On "Concert Caravan"

Roy Locksley, popular and versatile musical director of CFRB, Toronto, will be guest conductor on the Commission's "Concert Caravan" program tonight at 9:00 P. M., A. S. T. Mr. Locksley will present the program from the Commission studios at Toronto at the invitation of Stanley Maxted, regional program director for the Commission.

An extensive career in radio and concert work and a particular flair for composition, in addition to real executive ability, have made Roy Locksley an important figure in Canadian radio circles. He has over 60 compositions to his credit, and literally hundreds of arrangements. Like most successful musical arrangers he has a habit of working twelve or eighteen hours at a stretch. He has the vitality that makes hard work under pressure a pleasure to himself and the results, good entertainment for his public.

He is a member of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra and is a featured trumpeter in that organization. He has studied with Leo Smith and Dr. Ernest MacMillan. He has had a long schooling in theatrical playing which gives him a good slant on program presentation. He gets his biggest thrill out of hearing an orchestra play his own compositions as he intended them to be played when he wrote them.

"Concert Hall" To Be Resumed For Summer

"Columbia Concert Hall," one of the CBS chain's most popular programs last winter and winner of a special award made by the Women's National Radio Committee, has been resumed by popular demand of radio listeners and will be heard over the nationwide network throughout the summer.

The new series was inaugurated Saturday, June 22, from 9:00 to 9:30 P. M., A. S. T., and is heard each week at the same time.

When the "Concert Hall" made its debut, only artists of established reputation were featured with Conductor Howard Barlow and his Columbia Symphony Orchestra. The new summer series, however, will reverse this policy and introduce comparatively unknown vocalists who show promise of developing into stars.

The first guest on the half hour program with Barlow's Symphony was Bruna Castagna, young Italian lyric contralto. The second will be Allen Burt, baritone, who will be heard on Saturday, June 29. Burt is a native of Toronto, Canada, and studied at the Eastman School of Music, Rochester, New York. He has appeared with the American Opera Company in this country, and has had considerable concert experience in Canada. Julia Mahoney, soprano, will be Barlow's guest the following week.

Columbia Presents "Music of the Church" In New Summer Series

Music of ten denominations will be presented in the new "Music of the Church" series which supplants during the summer the "Church of the Air" programs on the WABC-Columbia network. The programs will be broadcast each Sunday from 10:00 to 10:15 A. M., A. S. T. The series opened Sunday, June 23, with a program sung by the Columbia Mixed Quartet and comprised of hymns of the Episcopal Church. Subsequent periods will feature the music of Presbyterian, Lutheran, Baptist, Methodist, Christian Science, Jewish, Mormon-Congregational and Catholic Churches in order named.

The "Music of the Church" series was planned to afford listeners an appreciation of music of the different denominations and its background. A short historical sketch of the inception of each hymn, its evolution and composer will accompany its presentation by the quartet.

In collecting representative music of each denomination the program department of the Columbia Broadcasting System was assisted by the executive offices of the churches represented in the series. With no distinct line of demarcation separating music of some of the denominations, such as the Presbyterian and Congregational songs familiar to each will be heard on their respective programs.

Worth A Million

After viewing first screenings of the Voice of Experience's "Stranger Than Fiction" series of movies, picture officials estimate that the 26 shorts will bring in at least one million dollars. The shorts are to be given equal billing with the feature picture wherever shown.
