

MENACE TO PUBLIC HEALTH DISCOVERED

Reported That Piggery On Outskirts of City Menace to Health

Many Complaints

Matter for Bd. of Health and County Officials To Deal With

There has been many complaints heard recently regarding a public nuisance and a menace to the public health which exists on the outskirts of the city in the vicinity of the road leading to the golf links. It is said that someone has a piggery on the left hand side of the road in which two hundred hogs are kept. It is understood that this affair is outside the city limits but the odor from it reaches for a considerable distance around, and passing motorists, as well as people who have business in that vicinity can hardly stand the stench which emanates from the pens, especially when the wind is blowing towards the inhabited portion of that area.

Complaints, it is understood, have been made to the city authorities but this is a matter in which the County Board of Health and other County authorities are required to act. Such an establishment may be a useful one commercially to parties who are running it but for the public good it may well be removed to some more remote place where it will not injure the health and comfort of the general public, who should not have to put up with such a thing so close to town.

Last Day Sees Candidates Finishing Prov. Programs

Larger City Poll Likely

Deputy Returning Officers Names for 18 City Polls for Thursday

The New Brunswick Provincial election campaign which has been one of the most hotly contested since Confederation will come to a close tonight. Tomorrow the battle of the ballots will take place and tomorrow the people will decide who will represent them in provincial affairs for the next five years.

Tomorrow the polls will open so far as Fredericton is concerned, at nine o'clock (Daylight Saving Time) and will close at 5 o'clock (Daylight Saving Time). In Marysville, while the polls open at the very same minute and close likewise, according to Marysville time or as some people will call it the Old Time, from eight o'clock to four o'clock. Devon will be on the same time as Fredericton.

Today both parties are busy lining up their forces for tomorrow's battle and both the government and opposition committee rooms are busy hives of activity with telephones kept busy by the party workers, and final arrangements are being completed. The weather today gives promise of a fine election day tomorrow and a good vote will probably be got out by both sides.

Increase in Voters

There is an increase in voters both in city and county and likewise an increase in the number of polling places. The up town poll, which is at the city hall, will contain ten polling places, and the downtown poll, at the court house, will have eight polling places.

Sheriff Roy W. Smith is the chief returning officer. The uptown polls will have as deputy returning officers the following: F. I. Haviland, Sterling Brannen, Major Randolph Crocker, William Clark, R. B. VanDine, Peter Farrell, Charles Weddall, F. L. Cooper E. C. Armstrong, and Royden Colter. The downtown poll deputy returning officers will be: J. S. Sott, George Bliss, R. H. Simonds, F. P. Lister, Frank Thomas, Mac Young, Walter Logue and Arthur McK. Limerick.

DEVON GOES ON DAYLIGHT TIME AT MIDNIGHT

Devon has followed the example of Fredericton in the matter of adopting Daylight Saving Time for the summer months. Today a proclamation was issued by the Town Clerk of Devon declaring that "Whereas a large number of citizens in Devon because of their work and proximity to Fredericton have suffered much confusion and are put to great inconvenience because of the change in time," and "Whereas several industries and institutions have voluntarily adopted Daylight Saving Time in the Town of Devon," and "Whereas other circumstances of like nature make it necessary and advisable for the Town of Devon to adopt Daylight Saving Time," therefore Daylight Saving Time will go into effect at midnight tonight in Devon and will last until August 31 at midnight. The ceremony of placing the clock ahead one hour will go into effect in the Town of Devon tonight, when at 12 o'clock it will instead, be officially one o'clock. The new time schedule is by order of Mayor A. J. McEvoy and aldermen of the Town of Devon.
