

## DISTRIBUTION LINE TO INCLUDE NAPADOGEN AREA

Prov. Government Approves Petition of Residents For Same

Capital Cost \$10,000

Henry Currie of Charlottetown Succeed J. W. Livingstone as Gas Inspector

The provincial cabinet in session here last night approved a petition of residents of Napadogen to have a distribution line of the Power Commission, now being constructed from North Devon to Stanley and vicinity, extended to include the Napadogen area. The approval is on condition that not less than twenty bona fide contracts for service and a contract from the Canadian National Railways for 18-horsepower of industrial power be submitted. The estimated capital cost of this would be \$10,000, the estimated annual cost \$1,577.50 and the estimated revenue \$1,605. A total of thirty residents may be served and the proposed rates will be the same as in the Stanley district. Napadogen is fourteen miles northwest of Stanley.

Premier Dysart announced that a demand had been made on the government by the bank in connection with a guarantee amounting to \$25,000 given Algonquin Sea Foods, Ltd., by the previous government. With a view to disposal it was decided to have an inventory taken of the stock and assets of the plant at St. Andrews, on which the government holds security, he stated. The government was committed to \$11,000 of the guarantee in the summer of 1933 and to the remainder in 1934, he stated.

### New Government Inspector

The appointment of Henry Currie of Charlottetown as provincial gas inspector, succeeding J. W. Livingstone, resigned, was announced.

W. K. Tibert, director of vocational education appeared and gave the government a review of vocational education in the province, showing the character of work being carried on in relation to the expenditures.

Further information will be obtained in connection with an application by the Town of Chatham for permission to issue bonds amounting to \$10,000 for relief purposes. The government approved a grant to the City of Fredericton Improvement Association.

## POULTRY BLOOD TESTING OF N. B. FLOCKS RESUMES

Field Work by Dep't. of Agric. Has Reduced Disease Frequency

Makes Statement

Hon. A. C. Taylor Announces Blood Test to Begin in September

Poultry blood testing for the control of pullorum disease in breeding flocks of hens and turkeys will be undertaken early in September, it was announced by Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture. This will be the eighth consecutive year that such a campaign has been conducted.

During the past seven years the percentage of reactors among tested flocks has been reduced to almost one tenth of its former frequency or from 14.44 per cent in 1928 to 1.47 per cent in 1934.

"It is felt," the Minister stated, "that further control of pullorum will be impossible while the unrestricted importation of day-old chicks from other provinces is allowed. At the present time the proclamation of 'Federal Regulations Respecting the Production and Sale of Chicks' for the 1936 hatching season is under consideration. If enforced within the province these regulations would exclude chicks from non-tested flocks which now enter without restriction. With this source of contamination shut off, it is felt that complete control of pullorum would be a possibility."

Pullorum or Bacillary White Diarrhoea is a highly fatal disease of young chicks, particularly in the first three weeks of their life. Not all the chicks that are affected die, however. A few usually survive and act as carriers of the disease to the next generation of chicks, the organism being carried within the egg. Blood testing detects these conditions. The actual testing of the blood must be made under laboratory conditions. The method used is technically known as the standard tube agglutination test and is similar to the blood test for abortion in cattle or typhoid in humans.

Pullorum was not a serious poultry disease until the advent of the mammoth incubator and what might be termed factory methods of raising chicks. Although it probably existed in the province early in the present century, it did not cause serious general loss until the years 1927 and 1928. In these years, particularly the latter, there was high mortality in flocks of chicks bought from commercial hatcheries. In an effort to locate the trouble the blood testing of flocks supplying hatcheries with eggs was undertaken by the Department of Agriculture and of the 10,579 birds tested, 14.44 per cent were found to be reactors or carriers of the disease. Chick mortality was decidedly less the following year as a result of the detection and slaughter of these reactors. So general was the improvement that blood testing was made a feature of the provincial poultry breeding policy and has remained as such ever since.

## Shot Through Lung, Condition Serious

David Jones, carpenter in this city, was on the danger list at the Victoria Hospital today. He was found this morning in the yard of his home on Aberdeen Street, a bullet wound in his chest, a .32 calibre revolver beside his body. Dr. A. L. Gerow, who was called, found that the bullet had penetrated the left lung. Jones was at once removed to the Victoria Hospital, where his injury is being attended to. This afternoon the man's condition was regarded as "fair." The attending physician pronounced the wound a serious one.

It is understood that the local carpenter has been in poor health in recent weeks. The city police who investigated the shooting have discovered no evidence of foul play.

The shooting which occurred about eight o'clock this morning was a tragic prelude to the plans of the Jones' family, who were to have taken over a store property in Devon today. Mrs. Jones had already left for Devon when the shooting happened. Mrs. Tracy Bates and Mrs. Albert Williams, neighbors, heard the shot and discovered Mr. Jones lying in the yard.
