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THIRD POLITICAL PARTY FORMED

Hon. H. H. Stevens Will Lead Reform Party In Dominion

Candidates Will Be Named For All Seats—Executive Is Formed—Members Disclose Plans.

OTTAWA, Ontario, July 8—A new third party which may be a big factor in the forthcoming Dominion elections has been formed. The announcement was made at Ottawa last night by Hon. H. H. Stevens.

The new party has as its slogan: "Reconstruction and Reform." The former Minister of Trade and Commerce says that the programme will be the same as he has been advocating for the past eighteen months.

The name and platform of the new party will be announced in a week's time.

The new party will be "in the fight" very soon and anticipated putting up candidates in all constituencies in the coming general election. He would make a trans-Canada speaking tour as soon as the campaign was launched.

His decision was made during the week-end after a conference with a provisional executive of the new organization composed of Warren Cook, Toronto, Thomas D. Lisson, Hamilton, and Thomas V. Bell, Montreal, "three prominent and moderate-sized business men."

The delegation had come to Ottawa following a meeting in Hamilton on Friday of representatives from the different provinces representing various classes of people in Canada, Mr. Stevens said.

Offered Leadership

A Canadian Press dispatch says: "On Saturday last," Mr. Stevens stated in his announcement, "a delegation representing many thousands of citizens resident in all parts of Canada waited upon me and presented a petition asking that I accept leadership of a party having for its object a reconstruction and reform program similar to that which I have been advocating during the past 18 months."

"This delegation on behalf of those whom they represent, claimed the right to present this program to the people of Canada so that their views might be expressed thereon. Furthermore they declare, and I agree with them, that it is contrary to the spirit of true Canadian democracy that our country's economic life should pass under the control of a privileged class, which, unfortunately, is exactly what has occurred. It is contended also that it is the duty of the Dominion government to protect our people from unfair exploitation, and to ensure to them equitable treatment and to the youth of Canada, a free opportunity for a normal Canadian livelihood."

"As I share these views, and realizing that both old parties are indiscreetly involved in the present system of concentration of control of wealth, I have decided to accept the call to leadership, believing that in this way we can secure for the people the best opportunity to express their will."

At Press Conference

The announcement of the former minister was made at a press conference. Headquarters of the new organization will be in Ottawa. He would be a candidate in the general election. Mr. Stevens stated in answer to a volley of questions, although he did not indicate in what constituency. East Kootenay, B.C., which he had represented in Parliament, had not held its Conservative convention to select a standard-bearer he remarked "but naturally I will not be running as a Conservative candidate."

Paris Sees No Hope of Britain Obtaining an Economic Blockade.

PARIS, July 8—France's intention of leaving Italy a free hand in Ethiopia was officially indicated today.

Authoritative quarters regarded Premier Mussolini's determination to go ahead with his plans, expressed by him in a speech yesterday, as blocking any chance Britain might have to win France over to sanctions against Italy.

France, like the United States, is not inclined to participate in an economic blockade," it was said, in informal quarters, "for we prize the friendship which links us to the Italian people above everything."

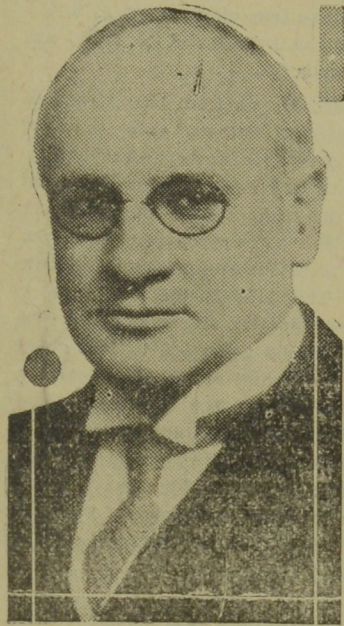
France is not even disposed to argue with Il Duce, indicating the probability Paris would approve Rome's action tacitly if not openly.

STOLEN CAR WAS FOUND BY MONCTON POLICE

Truro Machine is Discovered at Meadow Brook, Westmorland County.

MONCTON, July 8—A car owned by D. C. Vernon, 64 Queen street, Truro, and stolen from the Nova Scotia town last night, was located near Meadow Brook, Westmorland county, by Chief of Police Hutchinson and Sergeant Murphy, of the Moncton police, after they had received word that a car answering the description had been there all day.

Clarence Dutcher notified the police that a car of the same make and color as reported stolen from Truro had been parked on the highway, about one mile from Meadow Brook station, all day, the car bearing N. S. License plates. Chief Hutchinson and Sergeant Murphy went to the scene and found the car. The gas tank was empty, but the keys were in the car, and apparently, it had been abandoned this morning after running out of gas.

A meagre description of the alleged culprits was furnished police by the Truro authorities, but, up to a late hour no arrests had been made. The car was not damaged.

Miss MacVey who has recently arrived in Vancouver, B.C., has been in poor health for the past few months and is under medical observation. She may return with her mother and sister to this city temporarily. Miss MacVey has been teaching in a missionary school in Formosa.

Miss MacVey was in the zone of the gigantic earthquake which struck Formosa some weeks ago and in a letter to her parents here, described the horrors of that event.

Securities of Foreign Governments Will Not Be Traded on Unless Information Is Supplied to Show Internal Structure Is Sound.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 8—The United States, through the Securities and Exchange Commission, called on foreign governments, whose securities are traded on National Exchanges here to supply information on the financial condition of the country and pertinent data on the issues involved. The requirements must be complied with by December 31 if the issues are to continue to be traded on the exchange of the country.

Constituting a most unusual procedure, requiring one country to give information on its internal condition to another, the rules, made public yesterday, are required under the securities Exchange Act of 1934. S. E. C. officials believe that the simplicity of the data requested will preclude protests, but it was admitted that objections might be raised on the basis of the sovereignty of other countries.

The Securities and Exchange Commission is bringing all exchange securities under permanent registration and the form for her foreign Governments and their political subdivisions is a follow-up of forms to be used requirements are being drawn up for foreign issuers other than Governments.

A foreign Government will have to submit to the commission the following information on its own financial condition:

Internal and external funded debt, to the stated in the first case in the currency of the country and in the currency in the currencies payable.

Internal and external floating indebtedness, to be stated in a similar manner.

Receipts classified by source, and expenditures, classified by purpose, itemized as to be "reasonably informative" and covering "both ordinary and extraordinary receipts and expenditures."

The note issue and gold reserves of the Central Bank of the country and further gold stocks held by the country.

In addition, the S. E. C. asks for a statement, in terms of weight and value, of imports and exports during the last fiscal year and for the balance of international payments during the year. A description of the exchange control of the country in question is requested, while actual data on the issues involved delved into with the following inquiries:

"Give the title and full designation of the issue and if not included therein, the rate of interest and the date of maturity. If due serially, a brief indication should be given of the serials."

POISONOUS FUMES KILL TONS OF FISH

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas, July 6—Fishermen who ventured out to Padre Island for a day yesterday were confronted by the sight of thousands of tons of dead fish, washed up on the shore of the island.

Fumes, identified as sulphur dioxide, rose from the waters of the Gulf of Mexico, so strong that persons walking on the beach found it difficult to breathe.

An earthquake or other submarine disturbance was blamed by investigators for the strange phenomenon.
