

BALDWIN REFLECTS CHARACTER OF BRITISH PUBLIC OF TODAY

Most Representative Englishman of His Time Is View of People There on New Prime Minister.

LONDON, England, July 7.—"Show his own ranks. He stalked his whole political career on that policy and one but he could have carried the Conservative party with him in the teeth of its own convictions, and feelings.

It can be said with confidence, however, that the character of the English people is reflected in the restoration of Stanley Baldwin to the position of Prime Minister in succession to Ramsay MacDonald.

Mr. Baldwin has come back to power by virtue of qualities which make him quite unchallengeably the most representative Englishman of his time. It is true that his return to the premiership is the result of a reconstitution of the Government and not of an appeal to the electorate. But no one doubts that if there had been a general election, the result would have been the same. And if there is an election in the autumn, as there probably will be, the result will, in the absence of quite unforeseen possibilities, still be the same. For the plain fact is that no other candidate for the office is visible. It is a case of 'eclipse first and the rest nowhere.'

FREE FROM PERSONAL AMBITION

This is the more remarkable because Mr. Baldwin is the least histrionic and self-assertive of men in public life. His freedom from personal ambition and his indifference to the arts of self-advertisement are so marked that they would be regarded as a pose in other men, but that suspicion never attaches to him. He has by universal consent no private ax to grind and no interest to serve except the public interest. He is a party leader, but his horizon has never been bounded by party calculations. He is first of all a citizen of the world and a good European, and whenever the prejudices of his party come into collision with what he believes to be the higher interests of human society his action is never in doubt.

DISARMS HIS OPPONENTS

But for his steadfast, undeviating loyalty to the idea of the extension of self-government to India, the India bill, which is now reaching its final stages, could never have overcome the powerful and ingrained dislike and fear of the policy which prevailed in

QUEBEC SUPPORTS THE HOME OWNED STORES

Quebec Province Independents Get 78 pc. of Grocery and Combination Store Trade as Against 22 pc. For The Chain Stores.

The chain stores in the province of Quebec do not seem to thrive as well as do the independents or Home-owned stores, according to figures submitted by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics of the Department of Trade and Commerce.

Recent figures from the Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa, show that the sales of all food stores in Quebec Province in 1933 were down 23.8 per cent from the basic year 1930. This is about the average decline in food sales in the various provinces of Canada. The 1933 business of grocery and combination stores alone in Quebec Province amounted to \$89,906,000 or 7.1 per cent of the 1930 figure—a decline of only 24.9 per cent. Combination stores are defined as those units selling both groceries, and meats. Sales made by meat markets alone in 1933 in Quebec Province were \$14,298,000, or 68.7 per cent of the 1930 sales figure.

The lower indices for both groceries and meats is largely accounted for by the reduced prices in 1933 as compared with those of 1930. There was, too, a greater drop in meat price levels between the two years than in grocery items.

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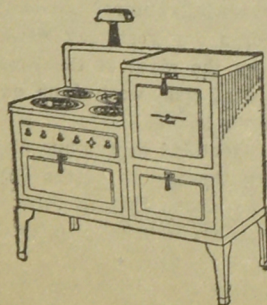
