ST. ANDREWS, July 7—Canada's vice-regal family is holidaying at this famous summer resort, the Earl of Bessborough, retiring governor-general, having arrived yesterday with Lady Bessborough to stay here until July 22, when he is due to appear at Fredericton in the course of his farewell tour.

Their Excellencies played golf yesterday afternoon and attended All Saints' Church this morning with their children, Lady Moyra Ponsonby and Lord Duncannon. Lord Bessborough will read the lesson at the morning service next Sunday.

The youngest child, Hon. George St. Lawrence Neillize Ponsonby, also is here for the summer. Lord Duncannon is a guest at the home of Senator Cairnie Wilson.

Accompanying Their Excellencies are Lieutenant Sir Michael Culme Seymour, Captain M. E. Adeano and three aides-de-camp.

Judge Supports Coughlin Action

CHICAGO, July 8—Judge James J. Kelly's opinion that Father Charles Coughlin doesn't want the use of Soldier Field Stadium "just to talk to himself" gave bailiffs a busy half hour in Superior Court.

The Detroit priest was seeking a writ of mandamus to force the Chicago Park Commissioners to grant him the stadium.

Attorneys for the Park Board argued that the refusal to lease the stadium was a private matter.

"I am not satisfied that Father Coughlin's petition has to do with a private right," Judge Kelly said. "I can't believe that he wants that huge stadium just to go over there and talk to himself."

Spectators in the crowded perspiring courtroom laughed and several started to applaud.

BUCHAREST, July 8—The unhappy childless marriage of two royal pawns of Balkan politics, reached its end today when the Court of Appeals divorced the former King and Queen of Greece.

OTTAWA, July 8—Following an all day meeting between officials of the Department of Finance and representatives of the leading life insurance, loan and trust companies, Finance Minister E. N. Rhodes announced today that probably within a week provisions of the Housing Act would be made available to the public.

NANTES, France, July 8—The French steamer Divette rammed and sank the French motor trawler Saint Remy in a fog last night, it was revealed today when the Divette entered Port Belle Isle with three of the Remy's nine-man crew. The remaining six were missing and undoubtedly perished.

NEW YORK, July 8—Premier Jos. A. Lyons of Australia has arrived in New York from Italy on board the Rex en route to Washington and Ottawa, where it is expected he will discuss matters of mutual interest with the heads of the American and Canadian Governments.

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Upriver Potato Men To Organize In Victoria and Carleton

PERTH, Victoria County, July 8—All potato growers in Carleton and Victoria counties will be invited to attend the annual meeting of the Victoria County Board of Trade, to be held July 4, with a view of organizing a potato growers' association to look after their interests, it was decided at a meeting of the Board of Trade council here Saturday night.

In moving that the invitation be extended Stephen G. Mooney suggested that the proposed organization be separate from any bodies of shippers, brokers and receivers. He believed that the growers as an organized unit would be in a better position to conduct their business, open a potato market in England and reopen the market of Cuba, by way of reciprocal trade. He also intimated that "the incoming government will welcome such an organization".

The annual meeting will also consider a request that the new government lend support in supplying the two counties with electricity at cost.

ial maturities, for example, "maturing serially from 1936 to 1940".

"State the currency or currencies in which payable and give the basis of determination for the currency conversion and at whose option, if payable in two or more currencies.

"Outline briefly the amortization, sinking fund, redemption and retirement provisions.

"State whether secured by any lien, the kind thereof and briefly describe the property or revenues subjected to such lien.

"If by law, decree or other administrative action, the security is not being serviced according to its original terms, outline briefly the provisions of such law, decree or other administrative action.

"State briefly the circumstances of any other failure to pay principal, interest or any sinking fund or amortization instalment.

"If guaranteed, state by whom guaranteed and outlined briefly the terms of the guarantee".
