GRIMM IS HEATED UP

After Scalp of Moriarty,
Says Umpire Was
Profane

CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—Manager Charlie Grimm, of the Cubs, last night threatened to bring charges of profanity against Umpire George Moriarty for allegedly "cursing and demoralizing my players during Saturday's important world series game."

Grimm said he would recommend to other Cubs' officials and to President Ford Frick, of the National League, that charges be placed with Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis against Moriarty.

The Cubs' manager claims that the American League umpire indulged in profanity in the sixth inning while ejecting Grimm and two Chicago utility players, Woody English and George Stainback, from the field after a dispute about young Phil Cavarretta's attempted steal of second base.

"Whether Moriarty was right or wrong in his ruling that Cavarretta was out at second doesn't matter," Grimm said. "He cursed my players in front of a world series crowd, and he can't get away with it. Not only that, he's an American League umpire, and he showed violent prejudice against our National League team."

"He overstepped his authority in ejecting me for making a protest against what I considered an unfair decision. As manager of the club I have the right to protest in such cases. And I remained within my rights. I used no profanity nor did I threaten Moriarty. But I was put off the field—and had to direct my team in a world series game through a knot-hole in a door."

JAPANESE BREAK SWIM RECORDS UNOFFICIALLY

Yusa, Makino and Koike
Break Records; Grut
Turns Tables on Petersen.

TOKIO, Oct. 7.—Japanese swimmers unofficially shattered four world long-course records in practice time trials undertaken in fifty-metre baths in anticipation of the national collegiate championships at Tokio. Masanori Yusa roared 200 metres free style in 2:13.8, shading the previous record of 2:11; Syoko Makino negotiated 400 metres in 4:42, clipping the claimed standard of 4:45.8, set by Jack Medina of Seattle, in the recent Japanese-Un-

Detroit Tigers Win 1935 World's Series From Chicago

Goose Goslin Strikes
\$50,000 Blow to Score
Mickey Cochrane for
Winning Run in Ninth.

DETROIT, Oct. 7.—Leon Allen Goslin, an amiable New Jersey farmer known far and wide as "The Goose", struck the \$50,000 blow today that carried Detroit's Tigers to their first world championship in a slugging, rip-roaring finish to the baseball wars of 1935.

With the score tied, two out and Manager Mickey Cochrane on second base in the last half of the ninth inning, "The Goose" produced the golden basehit, a line single over the head of Billy Herman, star second baseman of the Chicago Cubs, that brought Cochrane home with the deciding run.

Goslin's winning hit off Larry French, Cub southpaw, gave the battling Bengals a 4-3 victory in the sixth game, and carried them to triumph in the series by a margin of four games to two and enabled slim Tommy Bridges, curve-ball righthander to achieve his second pitching conquest after a thrilling struggle.

Coming after a brilliant stand by Bridges, who stopped the Cubs cold in their half of the ninth after Stan Hack had opened with a triple to deepest centre, "The Goose's wallop touched off one of the wildest hometown demonstrations any World Series has witnessed since the renowned Walter Johnson pitched over New York Giants at Washington in 1924.

Largest Detroit Crowd
The largest crowd that has ever seen a ball game in Detroit, 48,420 roaring fans who contributed to the seventh million-dollar "gate" in World Series history and the third largest of all, poured out on the field the moment that Cochrane crossed the plate, well ahead of Frank Demaree's futile throw in the general direction of

It was a highly exciting and dramatic climax to Detroit's long quest for the world championship of professional baseball. It was the first Tiger triumph in five attempts.

Four times since the modern inter-league warfare began officially in 1905 Detroit has had its pennant winner turned back by National League rivals. Twice the Cubs turned the trick, in 1907 and 1908. The Pirates followed suit in 1909. Last year the city's first championship club in 25 years was beaten back on its home grounds by the gas house gang of St. Louis in a seven-game thriller after returning home with a 3 to 2 lead.

Many Tense Moments in Game

The final game was filled with tense moments, some of the hardest hitting of the series and marked by a bitter renewal of the warfare between the Cubs and Umpire George Moriarty, of the American League, before Bridges earned the decision over French. Both pitchers went the route, under heavy fire, as each club collected an even dozen basehits. Both did some superb work in the pinches but the Tigers got the "breaks", when they could be most useful, and capitalized their chances to squeeze out their third one-run victory in the last four games.

Led by the sensational Billy Herman, who banged out three hits, including a home run in the fifth inning, and drove home all three Chicago runs, the Cubs put up a gallant fight to send the series into a seventh game. Scrapping all the way swinging from the heels against Bridges' fast ball, the National Leaguers tied the score in the third, took the lead in the fifth and yielded only after giving the Tigers a last-inning scare.
