**Wilmot Church Instal-  
ling Modern Organ**

a representative of The Daily Mail today, explained the workings of the new organ and showed the mechanical advantage which the Hammond organ has over its predecessor. The old Warren which is fifty-two years of age, was forced to be completely scrapped, save for certain parts which might possibly be used again. Prof. Harrison is supervising the erection of the organ. The installation of the new organ will have to mean a rearrangement of the choir seats, and this work is being done this week by carpenters.

The new Hammond organ will be officially played for the first time on the Sunday following the approaching one, Prof. Harrison said today.

The Hammond organ is a new musical instrument. It consists of two manual console with pedal clavier and a power cabinet. Organ technique is required to play it. Organists claim that it is comparable to pipe organs which cost as much as ten thousand dollars. It covers the whole range of musical tone color. An infinite variety of tones covering the flute, diatonic, string and reed families are instantly available to the organist. In addition, many tone colors never before heard on any musical instrument are possible. These new tones are beautiful beyond description and make possible a new interpretation to many musical works never before attempted on the organ.

All the mechanism is contained in the console. There are no reeds, pipes or vibrating parts. There is no electrical pick-up such as a microphone. Vacuum tubes are used to amplify but not to create or originate the tones. The instrument, however, is entirely electrical in its operation.

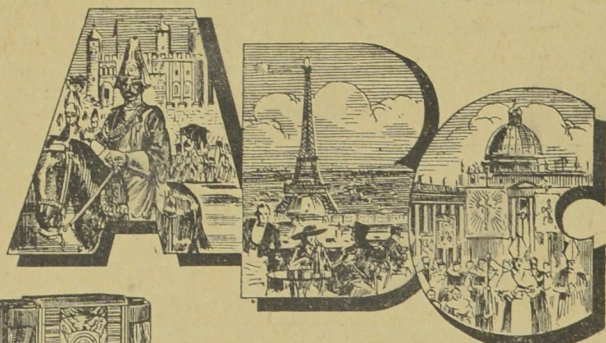
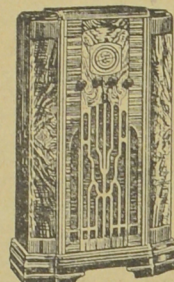
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
