Fredericton Home and School Association had its May meeting last night in the Central Welfare Rooms in the County Court House and while the attendance was not large a great amount of work was taken up and new members welcomed. The meeting opened with the Lord's Prayer and the Creed of the Association. A most interesting article on visual education from a Montreal newspaper was read to the meeting and the value of visual education shown. Mrs. Havelock Coy, Mrs. Thomas Styran and Mrs. A. E. Mathewson were named a committee to secure data on the subject and make arrangements for approaching the school board. The nominating committee reported and asked for an amendment to the constitution so that Devon and Fredericton be taken in, the name to be Home and School Association of Fredericton, Devon and Marysville, with the two towns to have representation on the board. This will be acted upon at an executive meeting before the annual meeting. A PENALTY FOR FALSE ADVERTISING

OTTAWA, Ont., May 30—A fine of \$200 or six months imprisonment or both is the penalty imposed for a species of false advertising under an amendment to the Criminal Code approved yesterday by the House of Commons.

The provision follows a recommendation of the price spreads commission.

It makes it an offence to include in an advertisement a statement or guarantee of the performance, efficacy or length of life of any product without such statement or guarantee being based upon a proper test.

Making untrue or misleading statements to obtain a passport or visa is also made an offence under the Criminal Code by another amendment approved yesterday. The penalty is imprisonment for two years or a fine of \$500 or both.

Commission on Dairy Products Met Here

Fredericton area comprises the city of Fredericton and the Town of Devon. So far there are five areas established in the province—Fredericton, Saint John, Moncton, Chatham and Woodstock. Applications for the establishment of areas in Sussex and Sackville have been received by the Commission. Even though the areas may be established the Act is not operative in those areas until a two-thirds vote is received from the producers, dealers and factories in their area. It is for this purpose that the commission is conferring this afternoon with the Fredericton delegation. Petitions are now circulating in several areas throughout the province and the commission will be conferring with the delegates in the areas for the next few weeks. It is the duty of the commission to set a minimum price on milk and cream sold in the areas under the Act. The petitioners in an area who are eligible to vote for the regulation of the commission are holders of non-cancelled 1934-35 licenses from their sub-District Board of Health, and a producer must have a permit to operate in an area coming under the Act.

Permits Necessary

The commission has drawn up four types of permits: (1) producer-supplier permit; (2) milk dealer permit; (3) factory permit, and (4) store-distributor permit.

The commission, composed of Dr. L. A. Donovan, Saint John, chairman; H. N. Flewelling, Sussex, secretary; A. D. Freeze, Sussex, and K. W. Miller, Moncton, is leaving tomorrow for Sussex, where they will continue their work of receiving petitioners' delegations.

Both Parties Favor An Early Appeal

The former New Brunswick premier—a bank employee for a time in his very early career—encountered opposition from Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Senate leader; Senator W. A. Buchanan (Liberal, Lethbridge), Senator W. A. Griesbach (Conservative, Edmonton) and Senator Murdoch.

Senator Foster said he saw no reason for taxing employees of banks and financial institutions out of the expected class. "The change will affect some 20,000 young men and women who are earning \$2,000 and less employed by banks; and probably 5,000 more people in other financial institutions", he stated. These people would have to contribute approximately \$250,000 per annum out of their wages and the institutions a like amount. The bill had been prepared on an actuarial basis; and this total annual contribution of \$500,000 annually from the institutions and employees would not bring any greater benefit to those who were paid unemployment insurance. The rate of unemployment in banks and financial institutions was very much lower than those industries which had asked for exception.

Senator Meighen declared the banking and commerce committee had decided to take cognizance of the experience in England and consequently had placed employees of banks and financial institutions under the bill in originating the Dominion plan. Three royal commissions in England which had functioned since 1920 had considered this class of employees should have been placed under the British plan at its inception.

Exceptions were asked for by railway and telephone company clerks and large departmental stores. What could the answer be to the railway clerks, for instance, who had as much constancy of employment as bank clerks if bank employees were expected? Senator Meighen questioned. Senator Buchanan opposed the amendment. "My own view", Senator Buchanan stated, "is there should be as few exceptions as possible". To grant exceptions would be to let "the poor suckers carry the load" Senator Murdoch stated.

Maritime Protests

Exemption from the eight-hour day bill was asked yesterday by tramway companies in Halifax, Sydney, Saint John and Quebec City. Representatives of the tramway interests were heard before the Senate banking and commerce committee at a second session which sat until a late hour to enable officials to return to their homes. 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which operates in Sydney was heard earlier yesterday.

The request was based on poor returns being made by these companies in their investments and representations that in running street cars 18 hours per day in each of these places difficulties would be encountered in applying an eight-hour day. Like the views of officials of the Dominion Steel and Coke Company and the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, who appeared at the first sitting, the representations were placed on the official record.

W. P. Southard and John A. Olive representing tramway operations in Saint John by the New Brunswick Power Company, told the committee the tramways had not paid dividends since 1932.

Exempt from eight-hour day provisions should be granted to small tramway companies or those operating in communities with populations of 100,000 or less, the officials claimed.

Notice appeared yesterday on the House order paper of a further bill arising from the recommendations of the royal commission on price spreads and mass buying. This will make formal changes in the Combines Investigations Act to bring into line with the measure, not yet presented, by which it is understood the government will seek to implement the main recommendations of the report for control of business.
