

## POLL OFFICERS FILING PAPERS OF ACCEPTANCE

Returning Officer Has  
Not Yet Received  
All Acceptances

107 Polls

The Advance Poll at  
McAdam Junction  
Opened Today

The acceptance papers of the deputy returning officers for the polls of York-Sunbury in the coming federal election are steadily being filed with Sheriff Roy Smith, chief returning officer. Although the deputies for the twenty polls in Fredericton City and three polls in Marysville have not yet all filed their papers, all those in York County are filed except three and all those in Sunbury are filed except one. All papers are expected to be filed by Saturday morning, Sheriff Smith said.

In York County there are fifty polls including poll 33 1-2 which was formed in Southampton fifteen years ago to convenience voting. Previous to that there were only forty-nine.

### No Advance Poll Here

The advance poll at McAdam Junction opened today at 2:00 P. M. There was no advance poll in Fredericton this election owing to the fact that application had not been made soon enough. The advance poll was automatically cancelled in 1930 when less than fifteen voters took advantage of it.

## HOLSTEIN FIELD DAY SUCCESSFUL

Conducted at Farm of C.  
Monty Giles on Wood-  
stock Road Today

Minister Speaks

Judging Contests, Inter-  
esting Talks, Part of  
Day's Program

A successful Holstein Field Day took place at the farm of C. Monty Giles on the Woodstock Road today, and was well attended. The program carried out was a varied one with many interesting features. This morning an inspection of the herd and stables was carried out and at noon dinner was served at Springhill hall by the Women's Auxiliary. Supper will be served early this evening at the same place.

Addresses were given commencing shortly after one o'clock, the speakers including Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture; C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station; and J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture. Upon the return to Mr. Giles' Brooklands Farm there demonstrations in cattle judging conducted by Leonard Griesbach, a junior judging contest open to boys and girls under 21 years of age with suitable prizes awarded including a silver trophy and cash prizes, also a senior judging contest open to all who were over 21 years of age. The prizes for this latter contest included 500 pounds of Monarch Pasture Fertilizer, 500 pounds of Royal Dairy Feed, 500 pounds of Monarch Grain fertilizer, and 100 pounds of Royal Calf meal. The contests were supervised by Stanley Wood, J. H. King, and Mr. Griesbach.

### Fine Talks

At 3:15 this afternoon several talks were given. D. J. Barrett spoke on Feeding Dairy Cows; J. H. King, Dominion live stock promoter, spoke on the subject of "The Importance of Selection, Breeding and Feeding"; and E. M. Taylor, provincial field husbandman, talked on the latest developments in pasture improvements.

Today's Holstein field day was arranged for by the Holstein Friesian Association, New Brunswick branch, of which Arnold Carpenter is president, and Lorne Logan is the secretary.

Mr. Giles where the field took place is the owner of twenty head of splendid cattle and is one of central New Brunswick's best known farmers and cattle breeders.

## Rumor of Football Fatality Incorrect

## MAGISTRATE NOTES LAXITY PREPARATION

Observes that Counsel  
Not Preparing Cases  
Carefully Enough

Assault Hearing Today

Con. Randall of R.C.M.P.  
Brings Case Against  
McAdam Men

In refusing a motion for an adjournment this morning the assault case of the King vs. Patrick McGillicuddy, of Bangor, Maine, Magistrate Walter Limerick tartly observed that the practice of counsel in asking adjournment in order to talk with witnesses was becoming altogether too prevalent. His Honor observed that there were a number of instances where the counsel did not have his case well enough prepared before coming into court.

The specific instance today was a request for an adjournment until two o'clock by Leo F. Cain of this city in order to consult with witnesses who would not be in the city until this afternoon. In refusing the motion, and commenting on the matter of excessive adjournments of such nature, His Honor made it plain he meant no aspersion to Mr. Cain. It was a general habit but none the less inexcusable.

The King vs. McGillicuddy assault case arises out of an occurrence at McAdam Junction early on Sunday morning last, when Constable Eric Randall of the R.C.M.P. was allegedly assaulted occasioning actual bodily harm. Besides McGillicuddy, Walter Feeney and Cyril Feeney are accused of the assault. Walter Feeney had pleaded guilty of the assault on October 7 and has been remanded for sentence. Both McGillicuddy and Cyril Feeney, the latter of McAdam, were (Continued on Page Four)

## FIRST MEETING SCIENTIFIC SOCIETY U.N.B.

Prof. S. C. Perry Spoke  
on Geology of St.  
George "Sheet"

Three-Year Program

Survey Party Found  
Granite to be Chief  
Mineral for Exploit

The first meeting of the University of New Brunswick Scientific Society held yesterday, was featured by the presidential address of Prof. S. C. Perry. Prof. Perry's subject was "The Geology of the Saint George Sheet, N. B."

The speaker has been in charge of a party of the Geological Survey of Canada this summer working in the Saint George district. He told of the work done during the summer.

### Three Years' Work

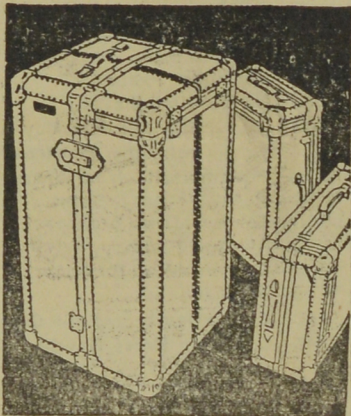
The plan is, Prof. Perry stated, to cover a section of 350 square miles in three summers' work. The speaker told of his troubles during the first month of work, in training his men. Once started, they surveyed westward and found granites, dyke-rock (both rocks of economic value), and ancient fossils. They could find no Cambrian strata. Professor Perry expressed doubts that any mineral deposits would be worth exploiting in that district, with the exception of the famous Saint George granites.

A budget committee was appointed, consisting of Prof. C. W. Argue and Secretary-Treasurer T. Tweedie, V. Balch, D. G. Gemeroy and Dr. R. H. Wright were appointed on the program committee. The Misses Jennie Mackintosh and Thelma Jewett were named as a committee to take care of the serving of tea.
