FARM CASH ACCOUNTS

Methods of recording financial statements relating to the farm are dealt with in detail by W. F. Chown, Accountant Examiner, Economics Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, in the September quarterly issue of the Economic Annalist. An adequate record of cash transactions is a necessity in the preparation of the Income and Expenditure statement. For this purpose, says Mr. Chown, it is highly desirable to cultivate the habit of securing a voucher for each transaction at the time it takes place. These should be filed in some orderly fashion. Statements and account sales rendered by companies to whom products are sold or shipped, and invoices for purchases are good vouchers. A receipt should be given when money is received and the particulars entered on the stub. When payments are made by cheque, the stub should be completed. Filing the foregoing, pencilled memoranda are useful and a pad and pencil in the barn of the time-honoured kitchen calendar have their place in building up an adequate record but do not in themselves make up that record. From these original records, the cash book should be written up as frequently and regularly as possible by the farmer, his wife, son, or daughter.

For farms operated by managers, farmers' clubs, co-operatives, and those individual farmers who are anxious to keep exact records, a columnar cash book is recommended. A columnar book may be purchased with the desired number of columns, or an ordinary notebook may be ruled as required. The purpose of such a book is to classify receipts and payments into whatever groupings are desired. Fuller details and illustrations of the columnar cash book are given in the article.

BALBO EXPRESSES OPINION

Air Marshal Italo Balbo, in an interview with Lady Drummond Hay, a noted British journalist, made the following statement:

"Italy is not occupying Ethiopia for the purpose of blackmailing Egypt through the sources of the Blue Nile. I can assure you that Italy has never even dreamed of invading and conquering Egypt.

"Egypt is the most civilized country in the Near East, yet it is not enjoying the complete independence which is the privilege of backward coun-

tries. And Egypt is not even admitted at Geneva. True, the Egyptians aspire to free themselves from British guardianship, but we know it is certainly not to exchange that for Italian domination. It is sheer madness to think of it."

CANADIAN LOBSTER POPULAR IN GREAT BRITAIN

Canadian canned lobster is very popular in Great Britain and for the first six months of this year as compared with the same period last year there was an increase of 17.9 per cent in the quantity imported, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. There is competition, however, from Japanese and Russian canned crabs.

The Duke of Gloucester, wearing a gold-faced blue tunic, breeches, and high boots, placed the Welsh gold wedding ring on the finger of his bride, who wore pearl-shaded satin, and they made their vows before the Archbishop of Canterbury.

The King wore a field marshal's uniform and the Queen was in a jewel-blue chignon velvet gown. The Prince of Wales, who passed the wedding ring to his brother, wore the uniform of colonel of the Welsh Guards and the Duke of York the uniform of colonel of the Scots Guards.

After the Bishop of London had opened the service the Archbishop of Canterbury repeated the pledges of matrimony with the bride and groom. As the Duke placed the gold ring on his bride's finger, he repeated after the Archbishop:

"With this ring I thee wed, and with my body I thee worship and with all my worldly goods I thee endow".

Receive Blessing

When the prayer and blessing had been said, the congregation sang the 67th Psalm, and then the couple knelt before the altar for the responses. The Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church led prayers, and the Archbishop of Canterbury addressed the couple and blessed them.

The wedding party bowed and curtsied before the King and Queen, and then filed out to the strains of the Mendelssohn Wedding March. The Duke and Duchess signed the register, followed by the guests and then went to the wedding breakfast in the palace.

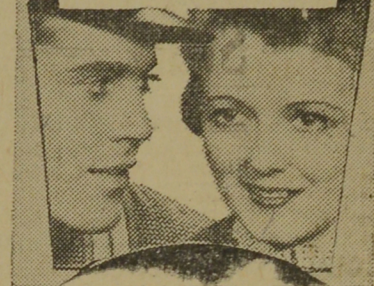
