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LOUIS FACING BUSY SESSION

Detroit Will Fight 3 Times in 7 Weeks

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—A busy three months today faced Joe Louis, Detroit batter, as he prepared to continue his quest for the world's heavyweight championship.

He has agreed to fight three times between Dec. 13 and Jan. 31 and make an exhibition tour lasting 11 days.

Mike Jacobs, head of the Twentieth Century Club, New York, who holds the option on the Negro's services, yesterday signed contracts for Louis to fight at the Chicago Stadium Jan. 19 and at the Olympia in Detroit some time between Jan. 27 and Jan. 31.

Previously Jacobs had arranged for Louis to meet Paulino Uzcudun at Madison Square Garden, New York, Dec. 13.

Fredericton High School asserted their right to the New Brunswick Interscholastic title when they white washed the McAdam High School rugby fifteen, New Brunswick Junior Interscholastic Champions, by a score of 11 to 0 in an exhibition game at College Field yesterday afternoon. Despite the large score the McAdam boys put up a fine game and F. H. S. had all they could do to beat their less experienced opponents. The Yellow and Black had only a slight edge in the territory play and were out-classed in tackling, the boys from the railroad town jarring the Fredericton boys heavily with their brutal assaults.

In the first half play was about even with Fredericton having a slight edge in the heeling, but not taking advantage of their chances to run the ball. After about ten minutes, of play Clark captain of the Yellow and Black, took a pass from behind the scrum and went over for the first try of the game. The McAdam team were taken unawares. Following the try McAdam seemed to become a little surer of themselves, and forced the play into Fredericton territory where the half ended.

Although F. H. S. scored two tries and converted one of them in the second half McAdam played a better game than they did in the first half of the game. They tackled and ran like demons, but did not have the necessary finish to carry them over for a try. Shortly after the half commenced they were in easy scoring range, but were penalized by referee "Shorty" Clark, and could not seem to get back in position again for a try. NIGHT GAMES ISSUE REVIVED

Other Major Clubs May Follow Reds

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Three National League and two American League clubs are seriously considering taking up the night base ball experiment introduced to the major leagues last season by the Cincinnati Reds, according to reliable reports circulating in base ball circles.

Statistics on the seven night games at Cincinnati—they attracted a total of 130,031 paid customers, an average of 18,500 per game—have made a big impression on major league moguls, especially in those cities where red ink habitually appears on the books at the close of the season.

Cincinnati will continue to play night base ball in 1936, and may be joined by the St. Louis Cardinals, Chicago Cubs and Philadelphia Phillies.

In the American League the St. Louis Browns and Washington Senators are said to be anxious to try nocturnal baseball if they can get permission from other club owners.

Last season the National League gave each of its eight clubs permission to play seven night games at home. Cincinnati, which had been losing money steadily for years, installed lights at Crosley Field and played one night game against each club in the league except the New York Giants. The Cardinals played two. At the end of the season the Reds were out of the red for the first time in many years.
