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Baldwin Not Too Optimistic About The War Situation

Italian Press Makes Violent Attack Against Great Britain — French Uneasy Over Italian- British Relations.

LONDON, England, August 8 — An official source disclosed yesterday that the British Government made "strong representations" to Italy on July 26 regarding "the recent violent attacks in the Italian press against Great Britain".

The representations were made through Ambassador Grandi of Italy by officials at the Foreign Office and it was stated he promised to inform his Government of the British attitude.

Since that time, according to the same source, the British Government has received no reply from Italy.

Ramsay MacDonald became acting Prime Minister of Great Britain yesterday on the eve of the expected climax to the Anglo-Italian controversy over Ethiopia.

FRANCE WILL TAKE LEAD

Uneasy over already frayed relations between Great Britain, and Italy, the Government, it was said, decided to let France take the lead in next week's tri-power talks at Paris. The decision was reached before Premier Baldwin departed for a vacation at Aix-les-Bains France.

Although Mr. MacDonald became nominal head of the Government, Mr. Baldwin was expected to maintain private contact with Anthony Eden Minister for League of Nations Affairs, while both are in France next week.

BALDWIN NOT TOO OPTIMISTIC

Mr. Baldwin left his duties here, represented as still hopeful that war between Italy and Ethiopia might be averted but not too optimistic over the situation.

Mr. MacDonald, taking over the leadership served notice through the National Labor publication that "I am still in the fight" for peace.

British quarters expressed hope that Premier Benito Mussolini could be convinced in the Italian conversations with Great Britain and France that the representatives of other nations on the League of Nations Councils would not keep silent at the next session if he proposed peace efforts.

UNDERSTANDING WITH U. S. URGED

The Times, urging caution insisted that "any decision taken by Britain at Geneva should be taken in the knowledge not merely that other members of the council agree with her but that they also are ready to act with her if action is necessary. And there is at least one important country outside the League with which an understanding must be reached".

Only One In Council Try To Entice More

SCOTSGUARD, Saskatchewan, Aug. 8 — Oscar Shirley, member of the village council, is not a quorum, so business of the village is suspended until another councillor can be elected. There are two vacancies, and citizens are trying to persuade at least one public-spirited man to accept office so the council can go into action, June 1 was nomination day and no candidates offered.

MARITIME SCHOOL HELD

The Maritime School for judges of plowing matches was held today at the Experimental Station here. More than thirty officials from the Maritimes were present to hear and see the moving pictures on use and work of the plow, and lecture of James McLean, Richmond Hill, Ontario, who is an expert in the design and handling of plows, being three times Ontario champion. A luncheon was held at noon at which Hon. A. D. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture, addressed the delegates and congratulated the officials on their success.

Speeding Through N. B.

The unfortunate accident on the Trans-Canada Highway between this city and Woodstock last evening by which a man lost his life while speeding on a motorcycle should be another warning against speeding on our roads. Speeding either by car or motorcycle is dangerous at all times, and it is against the law. It is especially dangerous when done by tourists and by other strangers who do not know our roads. Day after day accidents are taking place on the roads and in many cases those killed or injured are visitors who are careless and who do not know our road conditions.

A good suggestion has been made and that is that the customs officials at Edmundston, Richmond Corner, St. Stephen and others ports of entry from the United States point out to tourists that while our roads are perfectly safe under normal conditions that anyone speeding through the country at fifty and sixty miles an hour is taking his life in his hands. The officials mentioned should be instructed by those in authority to warn visitors that speeding stunts are absolutely against the law of our Province, and that the practice is extremely dangerous. These visitors do not know about our culverts. They do not know the geography of our roads, the curves, or the road intersections, and many conditions. If the tourist is driving at a legal rate of speed he is able to read the road signs pointing out all these conditions. If he is tearing through the country at fifty and sixty miles an hour he is liable to strike a bad curve or a car coming from an intersecting road or strike something that will shoot him into eternity before he knows what struck him.

It is bad enough for persons who know our highway conditions to travel at break-neck speed. It is suicidal for a stranger to do these things.

Our "dirt" highways, as the visitors call them, are perfectly safe and delightful to drive on under normal condition. Our scenery cannot be surpassed and may be enjoyed by tourists and by others at a moderate rate of speed. It cannot be enjoyed by those tearing along like crazy hornets. The Customs officers and the Information Bureau should have printed matter issued warning them that they are playing with a buzz-saw when they start fifty and sixty miles' stunts in New Brunswick. If they do not like that let them turn back. Coroners inquests cost us money, and the only assets which New Brunswick gets from these people speeding through goes to the undertaker.

In this particular case the sympathy of the community goes out to the family of the victim of the accident.

90TH HOWITZER BATTERY AWAY

The 90th Howitzer Battery is leaving at five o'clock today for the Union Station to undergo eight days of intensive battery training at the Petawawa training camp. The training period will be broken up into four days of technical field training and four days of individual battery and brigade shooting. Major Theodore C. Barker, O.C. of the 90th and official secretary to the Lieutenant Governor or was unable to get away through pressure of business. Thirty five of all ranks made the trip. The four commissioned officers were Captain Harris, Lieut. Gunter, Lieut. Tuttle and Major Dodge. Lieut. Amos was attached to the battery from the 89th field battery of Woodstock.

The 89th Field Battery of Woodstock and the 3rd Medium Brigade of St. John will be undergoing training at the same time.

GOVERNMENT IN SESSION HERE THIS AFTERNOON

The provincial cabinet continued its meeting here this afternoon, following last evening's session. No announcements were made by Premier A. A. Dystart either last night or today. It is expected that the premier will make a statement soon respecting what action will be taken by the New Brunswick government in connection with the employment bureaus in the province. The advisability of continuing these or cancelling them, is being considered, it is understood.

DR. HAMILTON TO BE BURIED HERE

The remains of the late Dr. D. W. Hamilton who died some days ago at Pullman, Washington, arrived here today by express, and the ashes are now at the funeral home of H. R. Adams.

The funeral will take place tomorrow at two o'clock from the Adams' undertaking establishment. A private service will be conducted at the graveside at the Rural cemetery extension and interment will be made alongside the late Mrs. Hamilton, wife of the deceased who passed away about three years ago. The remains were cremated following the death of Dr. Hamilton at Pullman and arrangements were made to forward them here.

MARYSVILLE MAN DIES

The death occurred in the Victoria Hospital this morning of John Flynn, of Marysville, after a brief illness from pneumonia. The late Mr. Flynn was removed to the Victoria Hospital several days ago when his condition became serious. He died there at an early hour today. Deceased is a native of Scotland and has been an employee of the Canadian Cottons, Ltd., at Marysville, for the past ten or twelve years. His death will be widely mourned, as he was well known and respected for his many fine qualities. Surviving besides his wife, are his mother and father, and two children, James and William, both at home; also a sister, Mrs. Agnes Andrews. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

MOTOR VEHICLE INSPECTION WEEK NAMED

Rigid Inspection Promised by Hon. A. A. Dystart, Premier and Minister of Public Works — Motor Vehicle and Gas Tax Receipts Ahead of Last Year.

The week of August 11th to 17th has been chosen for Motor Vehicle Inspection Week, according to information given by Hon. A. A. Dystart, Premier and Minister of Public Works today.

"The large number of motor vehicles, both resident and tourist, on our highways this year necessitates this precautionary measure," the Premier stated. "Our primary object is to ensure the greater safety of the motoring public. Violations of the Motor Vehicle Act involving carelessness on the part of drivers and owners will be prosecuted."

Special attention will be given to all safety appliances, such as brakes, lights and reflectors. Trucks will come in for close scrutiny upon the part of the inspectors and regulations respecting the speed thereof will be strictly enforced.

Increasing Vehicles

The steadily increasing number of licensed province-owned vehicles is shown by the sales of licenses during the first nine months of each of the three fiscal years 1932-33, 1933-34, 1934-35. The comparison shows the following:

Cars—1933, 20,996; 1934, 22,746; 1935, 25,571. Trucks—1933, 3,219; 1934, 3,608; 1935, 3,996.

The increased number of vehicles in use this year is further reflected in the fact that motor vehicle receipts for the first nine months of the current fiscal year are above those for the same period last year by 10½ per cent. Gasoline tax receipts at the end of July this year were 27.6 per cent ahead of those for the same period in 1934.

LIBERAL LEADERS MEET, TALK OVER THE SITUATION

The provincial executive of the York and Sunbury Liberal Association met last evening for the purpose of making arrangements for the coming Liberal convention in connection with the federal election to be held in September. Ald. Moses Mitchell, of this city, presided and a representative gathering of Liberals were present.

Amongst other business considered was the matter of the selection of a candidate. Among the names of prominent Liberals mentioned were Ex-Mayor A. W. Coombes of Devon; Harry C. Greenlaw, of Millville; Peter J. Hughes, K.C., of this city; and also Abner B. Belyea and General F. W. Hill of this city. It is stated today that if Mr. Hughes can be induced to enter the contest that he will be the candidate, although some of the others are mentioned as possibilities.

COMMISSION MEETING

The Dairy Products Commission are meeting here today to consider the different details in the working of the general scheme. No further applications have been received from sections to go under the commission's ruling. To date there are seven sections under the ruling: Fredericton, Sussex, Sackville, St. John, Woodstock, Moncton and Chatham. Marysville goes under the regulations on August 12. H. N. Flewelling, Sussex, secretary of the New Brunswick Dairy Products Commission, will be in the area at that time for the issuing of permits. August 7 is the date of the expiring of the time for obtaining permits in that area. All producers sellers handling milk and fluid cream are required to obtain a permit costing one dollar. All of the board were present at today's meeting.

Matriculation And High School Exams Are Announced

Woodstock Girl Leads in Matric., Fredericton Boy Second — Bathurst Boy Leads High Leaving — 477 Successful in Matric., 146 in High School.

Seven hundred and twelve candidates wrote the Matriculation and two hundred and twenty-three wrote the High School Leaving examination. Of the matriculation candidates, forty-one (41) passed in first division; 303 in second division; 91 conditional in one subject, 12 conditional in two subjects, and 265 failed or wrote the examination in part only. Of the Leaving candidates, 3 passed in first division, 112 in second division; 28 conditional in one subject; 3 conditional in two subjects and 77 failed.

Pass Standard

For first division: 75 per cent of the aggregate marks obtainable with not less than 50 per cent of the possible marks in each subject. For second division: 50 per cent of the possible aggregate marks with not less than one-third of the possible marks in each subject.

The following are the names of those who passed in first and second division, arranged in order of merit: For the information of matriculants who wish to attend the Provincial Normal School:

Those who make First division and those who make Second division with an average of 60 per cent or better on Matriculation or High School leaving examinations are eligible to enter Normal School for First Class provided they are among the highest One Hundred of those who regularly apply. Regulation 31 (2).

Those who make Second division with an average of less than 60 per cent may be accepted for Second class provided they are among the highest one hundred and fifty of those who apply. Conditional students may enter for Third class provided they are among the highest fifty of those who regularly apply.

No student can be accepted who has not reached the full age of 17 years at the date of the opening of the Normal School (Tuesday following Labor Day).

Any student wishing to be enrolled must make application before August 12 to the Principal of the Normal School, Fredericton, stating (1) age, at opening of school; (2) examination number; (3) station where examination was written; (4) year of examination; (5) total marks, average and division.
