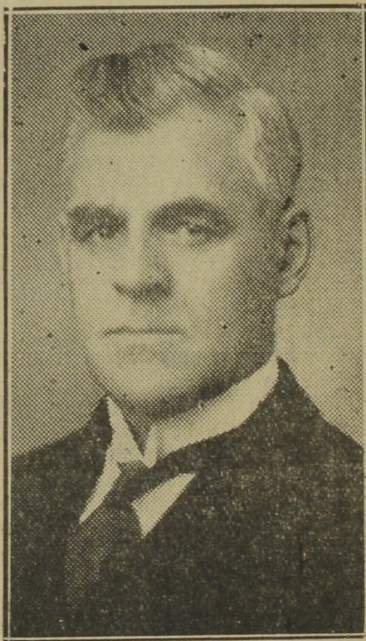

## Premier Dysart Opens F'ton's Fair

Recommended Advertisement and Campaign to  
 Buy New Brunswick Stock — Parker Currier  
 President of the Fredericton Exhibition Spoke  
 on Behalf of Fair — Mayor Clark for the City  
 Urges Increased Building.

Premier Dysart officially got the 83rd annual Exhibition away Satur-  
 day night when he declared the fair opened before a first night crowd of  
 about 1,000 people from the platform in the auditorium of the main build-  
 ing. The Premier commended the directors on the arrangement of the  
 program and wished every success that was due their efforts. Parker  
 Currier, President of the Fredericton Exhibition Limited, acted as chair-  
 man and mentioned a few of the contributing factors that have led up to  
 what promises to be the most successful Fair held in years. "It is sound  
 advertisement," stated Mayor W. G. Clark.

 hibition and chairman of the proceed-  
 ings, welcomed the visitors of the fair  
 on behalf of the directors and stated  
 that the great success was due to no  
 one person but the combined efforts

endeavored in every way to give fair  
 treatment and to cater to both an  
 industrially and recreational seekers  
 at the fair.

In 1934 lack of finance the fair sus-  
 pended the live stock show and were  
 financially better off for in years gone  
 by receipts had to be supplemented  
 by a grant from the Provincial Gov-  
 ernment, but the fair committee felt  
 that they were not carrying out the in-  
 tentions and the 1935 fair is to have  
 a live stock show that should come up  
 to the approval of all. In some places  
 it was generally thought many came  
 here and do not look at the livestock  
 but it is the plan of the directors to  
 give their greatest efforts to stimulate  
 live stock raising, particularly of  
 horses.

More R. O. P. Pens

The practice of the directors since  
 1932 in regard to poultry was to work  
 toward the achievement of a R.O.P. or  
 pure bred stock exhibit as it was  
 thought that it was in the best inter-  
 ests of the poultry business to do so  
 and although there were not so many  
 pens as in other years all pens were  
 of the highest type. The showing of  
 sheep and swine was up to average if  
 not better than in preceding years.  
 Agriculture in all the scope of the in-  
 dustry was well represented the fruit  
 and flower exhibit was one of the best.

The fish and game exhibit is rated  
 as better than put on at the Boston  
 Show. This year there are exhibits of  
 live beaver, deer, bear, raccoon and

 the order of the Minister of Public Works.

 iod the deposit will be forfeited.

 the directors have always brought  
 great credit on themselves and city  
 alike in the quality of fair put on and  
 the hearty wish for success is again  
 extended by the city.

Fredericton has one of the best  
 markets for agriculture, dairy, and  
 fish products. It is unique in that  
 places are free to the farmers and to-  
 day things are being marketed on  
 other days than the regular Wednes-  
 day and Saturday. Surely this will  
 bring greater prosperity when they  
 are so anxious to sell.

Building Needed

Agriculture was a favored class as  
 employment was congenial to man's  
 nature. There is a great need of new  
 buildings, there being an absolute  
 necessity for a cold storage plant in  
 Fredericton and an encouragement  
 also other enterprises would be good  
 for the city and country. The continu-  
 ance of the policy for paving roads  
 and a speeding up of road building  
 would attract a still greater number of  
 tourists, this policy is necessary to  
 attract the tourists.

Premier Dysart

"The scope of the Fredericton Ex-  
 hibition is more than provincial,"  
 stated Hon. A. A. Dysart, premier of  
 the province. "For many are interest-  
 ed in the outcome of its affairs who  
 live outside the borders of the prov-  
 ince. The excellence of the exhibition  
 is well known. Fredericton having  
 pioneered in this field, for here the  
 second exhibition ever to be held in  
 the world was established in 1852."

The Premier referred particularly  
 to the work of the late John A. Camp-  
 bell, who gave so much of his time  
 and energy both as a director and on  
 the several occasions when he was  
 president, to the building of an ex-  
 tensive exhibition plant that is one  
 of the finest in the Maritimes. Mr.  
 Campbell maintained his connection  
 with the Fredericton Exhibition until  
 his death, being then vice-president. It  
 is to men of this type, citizens in  
 every sense of the word, that the  
 Fredericton Exhibition owes its con-  
 tinued excellence and popularity.

Favoured Industry

The agricultural industry offers  
 perhaps slightly less cash but gives  
 stability to national life, it being the  
 basic industry of the country. We
