

### CONTINUE WORK PROVIDING GOV'T RELIEF

#### T. A. MacDonald, Supt. Colonization, Returns To Tracadie Area

#### 105 Suffered in Fire

#### Proper Distribution of Relief is Difficult Job to Handle

T. A. MacDonald, superintendent of colonization in the provincial government expects to return to Tracadie, Gloucester County, tomorrow to continue the direction of providing provincial government relief to the families who suffered from the recent forest fires. There are seventy-nine families in the Tracadie district, fourteen in Caraquet, eleven in Belledune, one in Maissonette—making 105 in all. The provincial government is providing temporary shelter in the way of tents and vacant houses and also is providing clothing and blankets and the Red Cross Society is also sending in food and clothing.

It is a very heavy job, compiling the lists of requirements and supervising the proper distribution of relief which has assumed much larger proportions than was first anticipated. The 105 families mentioned mean that somewhere between 600 and 800 individuals including children have to be provided for. Mr. MacDonald and his staff are now busy on the job.

### FREDERICTON'S EXHIBITION IN FULL SWING TODAY WITH CHILDREN'S DAY A FEATURE

#### Pupils in Schools Given Half-Holiday to Attend Fair—Judging in Various Departments to Commence at Once—Open Air Shows Function Tonight—Crowds Gather.

Fredericton's 1935 exhibition got underway today with crowds flocking to the grounds early this afternoon. Today was featured as Children's Day and the pupils of the city schools were given a half-holiday in order to attend. Beautiful September weather graced the occasion for opening day with prospects of continued fine weather through the week.

Thousands of children of school age left the Fredericton schools today with but one ambition and that was to see the big fair in full swing and they were not disappointed for all was in readiness. The midway at about half past one began to be crowded with old and young out to have a real good time. All schools in York county were given a half holiday and many parties came in from outlying districts to visit the fair grounds and partake of the entertainment.

#### Special Fares

The Fredericton exhibition has arranged with the Ben Williams shows to have special fares for today, citizens and visitors are requested to co-operate with the exhibition president and directors to see that all the youngsters have one great time.

#### Bicycle Races

In conjunction with the fair committee's programme of outside attractions the Fredericton Playground Association put on a series of bicycle races today on the race track. The free acts start at 2:30 p.m. and the grandstand was fast filling with thrill seekers. Tonight's outside attractions commence at eight o'clock and will be complete in all features. The great attraction for the children's day was the act of performing lions and bears something that was truly marvellous to behold. The exhibition directors are to be congratulated on the type of outside attractions that they have brought here.

#### Open Air Attractions

This year's open air attractions had a full showing this afternoon at the race track. In all there are five troupes all headliners. Among these is the South American aerialist Valancia, who takes the place of the late Brava, killed recently in the United States while performing his act. Also there are the four Leo Tards from France, a comical flying trapeze act; Captain Walker's Jungle Wonders, with lions and bears; the Five Juggling Jewels, beautiful girls in a juggling act, and also the Gladstones, acrobatic comedians. The York Regiment Band will be on hand each day and will play band concerts as well as furnish musical color for the open air attractions.

Tomorrow will be Race Day with three classes scheduled. Wednesday and Thursday will be the big race days the free-for-all being set for Thursday.

#### HEPBURN COMING

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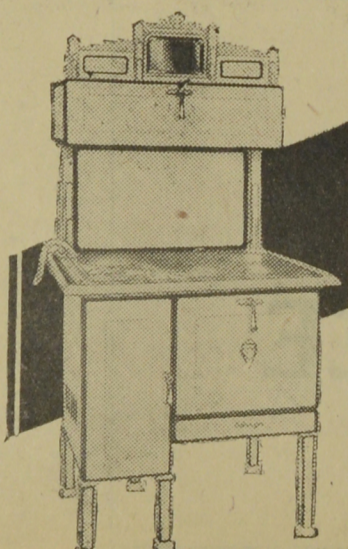
