

## DEATH OF FORMER LOCAL MAN IN THE CITY OF TORONTO

Friends Here Shocked to Hear of the Death of James N. Slattery

Had Many Friends Here

Was Employed With H. O'Neill's Bakery Here; Funeral in Saint John

Friends here were shocked to receive word this morning from Toronto of the death at that place on Wednesday last of James N. Slattery, formerly of this city. Mr. Slattery passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. H. M. Potticary.

Mr. Slattery came to Fredericton about fifteen years ago from Saint John and made his home in this city until December last, when he removed to Toronto. He was employed during his years in Fredericton with O'Neill's Bakery. Both he and Mrs. Slattery made very many friends during their residence in Fredericton. He was a member of the Fredericton council, Knights of Columbus. The word from Toronto stated that Mr. Slattery had died following a paralytic stroke, and that it was entirely unexpected. On February 26, Mr. and Mrs. Slattery celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding. He is survived by one son, J. Louis Slattery, who is a member of the news staff of the Montreal Gazette, and one daughter, Mrs. H. M. Potticary, of Toronto. Mrs. Slattery and her daughter are en route to Saint John today. The funeral will take place in that city tomorrow morning, with High Mass of Requiem at the Cathedral.

## MODIFICATION REGULATIONS RE TOURIST ENTRY

Revision of Customs Regulations to Benefit U. S. Tourists

### List of Articles

Various Articles Tourist Luggage Lately Added To Free List

Canadian Customs regulations governing the entry of tourists' outfits into the Dominion have been favorably modified and in future will allow free entry to a number of articles heretofore admitted subject to deposit.

Authority for this announcement is contained in a communication received today by D. W. Griffiths, Director of the New Brunswick Government Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel from the Customs Division of the Department of National Revenue.

The list of articles from which the deposit requirement has been removed includes boats (portable), canoes, outboard motors, tents, camp equipment, radios, phonographs, musical instruments and typewriters. The communication states that "persons visiting Canada for a limited period of time for health or pleasure may bring with them" articles enumerated if "previously used by them and imported for their own personal use, without deposit."

### Guns and Rifles Too

Guns, rifles, (not including revolvers or pistols), fishing tackle, golf clubs, tennis racquets and cameras (still and motion picture, as well as a reasonable quantity of film for use therein) all named on the former free list, are restated for free entry in the current communication.

"Household furniture and other effects," states the note, "brought in by a non-resident for the temporary equipment of a summer residence and to be exported within the season, may be admitted upon reporting same to the Customs office and depositing a sum of money equal to the duty and taxes on said articles. This deposit will be refunded if the articles are identified and exported within eight months from time of entry."

Wearing apparel and other personal effects are passed free without entry at Customs.

### ROUTINE IN HOUSE TODAY

The House will continue this afternoon with routine matters, no speakers being scheduled, Premier Tilley has declared today to be "Saint John's Field Day." The reason for this is the attention which the House and the Municipalities committee is giving to Saint John bills, in which delegations from Saint John are presenting argument. The Municipalities Committee which met this morning adjourned at noon until two o'clock when the St. John bills will be again taken up. The House will adjourn this afternoon until Tuesday, when the budget debate will be resumed. The budget debate is expected to complete next Thursday. When the N. B. Legislature resumes on Tuesday of next week Hon. A. A. Dysart will be the first speaker to be followed likely by Hon. D. A. Stewart, and possibly Premier Tilley.

### TO SPEAK AT A DINNER

## POPULATION GAIN PROMPTS PARISH DIVISION

The Committee on Law Practice and Procedure Consider Bill

Racial Division Involved

New Parish Would Be Known As Denmark; Local Man Counsel

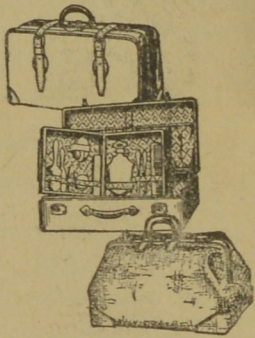
An increase in population of 42 per cent in recent years, and the fact that the Danish element of the parish of Drummond has not required poor relief since their settlement, were given as the fundamental reasons for desiring a division of the Parish of Drummond in the County of Victoria, by Councillor A. J. Jensen, when he appeared before the Committee on Law Practice and Procedure in support of the bill. C. R. Hawkins, counsel for those opposing the bill, claimed that the fundamental principle involved in the change was wrong and contended that a vote should be taken to the people concerned in the division. The bill will be considered further in private session. J. H. A. L. Fairweather, government member from Kings county, occupied the chair.

Coun. Jensen

A. J. Jensen, councillor from the parish of Drummond in the County of Victoria, explained a bill to divide the parish of Drummond into two parishes. He stated that the population of the parish has increased about 42 (Continued on page 5)

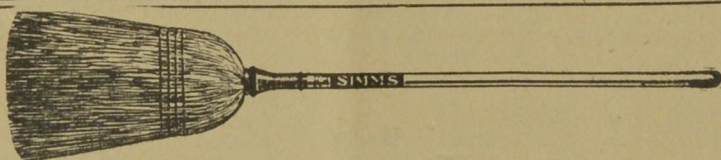
