Heard in Canada over the National network of the Canadian Radio Commission, and in the United States through the facilities of the Mutual Broadcasting System, "Summer Follies", a CRBC weekly feature, is gaining a reputation as an excellent "cocktail of summer entertainment". It is produced in the Commission's Montreal studios by H. Rooney Pelletier and George Temple, and is heard at 10:30 P.M., A.S.T., each Saturday.

For the June 15 presentation of "Summer Follies" there will be heard as usual, Jack and Jake, comedians, Howard Fogg and his orchestra, a dramatic sketch, and two guest vocalists. Jack and Jake will make a hilarious attempt at mastering the art of fishing, with interesting results. The dramatic skit, written especially for the program by Ivan Tyler, is entitled "Zero Hour" and has a background of Great War trenches. Howard Fogg will offer a musical novelty of his own composition entitled "Three Times Around the World", and the guest singers will be Dodo Davis, crooner, and Lucienne Delval.

CRC Presents Brilliant Pianist In Recital

Ursula Malkin, of Vancouver, one of the most brilliant of present day pianists, will be presented over the national network of the Canadian Radio Commission on June 16, in a 15-minute piano recital from 10:15 to 10:30, Commission program officials have announced.

A former student of the internationally famous Russian pianist, Jan Cerniavsky, Miss Malkin, in 1928, won the Gold Medal for all Canada in her teachers' and performers' A.T.C.M. examination. Following numerous concert appearances, she was chosen assisting artist at the inaugural program of the Vancouver Symphony Society, at which she played Beethoven's fourth piano concerto.

Miss Malkin later studied for two years in Vienna under Dr. Berta Jahn, pupil teacher of the great Leschetizky and with Egon Wellesz, the noted modernist composer. She won high praise following several concert recitals.

Since returning to Canada, Miss Malkin has added to her laurels with performances and concert tours throughout British Columbia and the United States. She again played with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra and sometimes later appeared with the Hart House String Quartet.

Jacques Fray, the Parisien member of this team, was the son of a French banker who sent him to the University of Paris for a business course. But Jacques soon chose the keys of the piano rather than those of the cash register. He became absorbed in musical affairs in Paris and London—writing articles, giving recitals and composing for musical comedies and revues. Mario Braggiotti also is something of an international personage. His mother was a Chadwick of Boston and his father a Florentine teacher of singing. The young Italo-American spent most of his childhood in Italy studying.

The two first met in a music publishing house in Paris and subsequently played in concerts throughout Europe; appeared with Fred and Adele Astaire in George Gershwin's show, "Tip Toes"; and twice joined Maurice Chevalier for concert tours of the United States. Incidentally, they were the first concert artists to introduce American jazz in the staid confines of the Sorbonne in Paris.
