

HOUSEHOLDERS TO COURT UNDER HEALTH ACT

Thirty-three Involved in Speeded Up As Cam-Violations

Seven Plead Guilty

Magistrate Warns Liability of \$200 Fine To Violators

Seven Fredericton householders pleaded guilty to the charge of not having their homes connected with the city sewerage system, and were reminded by Police Magistrate Walter Limerick that their liable to fines of \$200 each. The cases were adjourned until next Friday at eleven o'clock and His Honor suggested that if some arrangement was made by that time about his sewerage it might affect his action with regard to the fines.

The seven who pleaded guilty were Robert Anderson, Robert W. Alexander, Howard McMinamin, Mrs. Edward Fletcher, Frank Fletcher, Hugh Moore and Earle Ward. The latter said he had gone as far as he could in the matter and was now waiting for the city to act.

Thirty-Three In All

Information in connection with the sewerage lapse were laid against thirty-three householders of this city at the instance of Dr. J. M. Cameron, chairman of the Fredericton sub-district Board of Health. Twenty-four of them on being warned, have already made some arrangements about connecting their homes with the sewerage system. All of the 33 are residents of districts newly sewered along Woodstock Road, Albert street and Northumberland street extension.

The eighth householder, John Partington pleaded not guilty to the charge before the police magistrate yesterday and his case was adjourned until next Friday morning. A ninth, William McDonald was not present.

The action against the local residents was decided upon at a meeting of the health board following a period of two years during which notices were sent requesting the householders to connect the system.

RIVER RISING

As a result of the recent rains the St. John river at this point is beginning to rise. In the past three days the river level has risen about four inches and today a further slight rise was noted at the pumping station.

CALL CONDITIONS GOOD

J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture for New Brunswick, has returned from an inspection trip north. He finds that this week's rains accomplished much good for the crops, particularly the hay crop, which is improving rapidly. Conditions in the counties of Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska are much improved, the deputy minister finds.

The examinations for provincial teachers' licenses which took place at the Provincial Normal School this week, were concluded yesterday. The exams had commenced on Tuesday, and three papers were written each day. The students of the Normal School—291 in number—will leave for their respective homes throughout the province during the week-end.

Joint Ceremony

Between 40 and 50 Members To Go to Welsford Tomorrow

Between forty and fifty members of the local branch of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L. will leave here on Sunday morning for Welsford, where tomorrow afternoon they will join in a joint memorial service to be held by the Provincial Command of the Legion, for Viscount Byng of Vimy and the late C. Robert Hawkins of this city.

The joint ceremony will commence at three o'clock and is being held in conjunction with the annual service of the Provincial Command at the Church of England in Welsford.

Rector To Speak

Rev. R. E. J. Britton, rector of the church, and padre of the command will deliver the address, one for Viscount Byng, it is expected and another short memorial address in tribute to the late C. R. Hawkins, who had been several times president of the Fredericton branch of the Legion and an official in the Provincial Command.

Cecil J. Coveney, president of the local branch, will be in charge of the Legion members going from the city and the trip will be made by auto. The Carleton Concert Band is expected to be in attendance and more than three hundred veterans from various parts of the province will likely attend.

NOMINATION DAY NEARING IN N. B. ELECTION

Activity of Both Parties Speeded Ups As Campaign Progresses

98 Candidates in Field

Meetings of Both Conservative and Liberal Parties Daily

The tumult and the shouting in the approaching New Brunswick election campaign is waxing more intense as provincial nomination day nears, and both Conservative and Liberal candidates are speaking daily throughout the province.

As nomination day approaches—it falls on Thursday of next week—government, opposition and independent parties are increasing their campaign activities. The interest of the electors is waxing, too, and there has been more interest in the past week than at any time during the early weeks of the campaign. Nevertheless the present campaign has been a relatively quiet one so far. The next two weeks will see climatic interest and activity on the part of candidates, supporters and the electors. June 27 is election day.

98 Candidates

To the present time there are 98 candidates in the field for the 17 constituencies, the 15 counties and the cities of Moncton and Saint John. Government and opposition parties each
