RECORD TROUT  
CAUGHT BY  
14-YEAR OLD

Reese, John and David Harris, sons of Ilean Harris of Four Winds, Salisbury, Conn., are among the parties, who have recently been enjoying the fishing on the Miramichi and Cain's Rivers in New Brunswick, Canada.

In company with their private tutor, Mr. Gaccon, the three boys lately completed two weeks as guests of Allen & Wade. The prize catch was made by David aged 14 years. It was a trout which, when taken from the water, weighed 6 1/4 pounds, measured 24 3/4 inches in length and 13 1/4 inches in girth. The catch marked the first occasion in five years on which a trout of such a weight and measurements had been taken from the Cain's River. Several other catches made by the various members of the party weighed between 3 and 4 pounds. The boy also landed a number of salmon and grise and reports from this and other parties currently fishing the Miramichi and other rivers in New Brunswick run to the effect that the large run of Atlantic salmon which ascended the rivers a few weeks ago are now taking the fly.
