Cabinet Members at Offices But No Announcements

Hon. A. A. Dysart, premier of the province, and Hon. C. T. Richard, provincial secretary-treasurer, arrived in the city last night and were at their offices today at the Parliament buildings. A meeting of the cabinet is scheduled for tomorrow morning. At noon today Premier Dysart had no announcements to make.

This afternoon tenders for the sale of \$1,358,000 province of New Brunswick debentures open and close. These are for the purpose of refunding a ten-year issue of \$782,000 and paying a floating debt of \$576,000. It is for this matter principally that the premier and the provincial secretary-treasurer are in the city today. Tenders opened at three o'clock, Atlantic Daylight Time.

No further announcements were made today respecting reorganization of government office employees though it is understood that a number of others, not yet announced, are pending.

Premier Dysart when questioned today at noon by The Daily Mail had nothing to say regarding a conference, which A. W. Barbour, deputy minister of public works, had recently with state of Maine highway officials. Mr. Barbour's report of the conference has been placed in the hands of the premier.

BUSINESS MAN COMPLAINS OF CARELESSNESS

Pay No Attention to Road Marks, Especially on Curves

A Near Accident

Stricter Surveillance of Provincial Highways Should be Kept

Speaking to The Daily Mail this morning a business man who has occasion to use the Woodstock Road between here and Springhill said: "I went to Springhill yesterday and drove along the new highway which has a white mark painted down the middle, especially around the curves so that people travelling in cars will keep on the right side of the road, thus avoiding serious accidents. While I was on the way yesterday six cars cut in front of me without paying any attention whatever to the marks on the road. In one place one of these cars cut in on a curve and on a small hill immediately ahead narrowly escaped colliding with a Woodstock car coming towards us. There came near being a mix-up in which the Woodstock car and my own and the man who cut in might all have been killed. This is only one example of what is happening every day on the Woodstock road between here and Springhill. People seem to take delight in speeding on this new piece of highway which the provincial government has recently put down."

The above complaint is one of many which has come to this office. The Daily Mail is under the impression that we were paying the Royal Canadian Mounted Police considerable money and that one part of their duties is to patrol the highways and to prevent just such occurrences as are taking place daily on the Woodstock road and other highways close to this city. The only time they appear to be on hand is after an accident has happened when they come around to view the remains of those who are killed, partly through want of attention on the part of those who are supposed to protect the highway. This might be something for the new government to look into. So far as the speeding on Waterloo Row, Brunswick Street, and streets within the city limits, one would imagine that our local police might be competent to look after it, but they do not seem to be doing so.

Accident Below City Last Evening, Several Injured

Miss Lillian Warman, of Maugerville, was treated at the Victoria Public Hospital here last night for injuries received in an auto accident, which occurred on a sharp turn about seven miles below this city on the St. John river road. A car driven by Stewart Patterson, of this city, collided with an auto driven by Edwin E. Warman, of Roxbury, Mass. Two occupants of the Warman car, Lillian, a sister of the driver and Dorothy Hannie, of Roxbury received minor cuts and bruises. Mrs. Warner and her two children in the Mass. car, and Jack Irvin and Percy Banks in the local car escaped injury. Miss Warman left the hospital this morning her injuries not being of a serious nature.

R. C. M. P. Constable David Evans investigated the accident and found that the drivers were blinded by the dust of a car who was proceeding toward Saint John, a short distance ahead of the Warman car. The dust so obscured the vision of the drivers that both cars were well in the middle of the road when the crash occurred. Where the accident occurred is known as Baker Brook Bridge. Dr. A. L. Gerow was called to the scene of the accident.

MILITIA UNITS PREPARE FOR TRAINING PERIOD

Machine Gunners and 90th Howitzer Battery Leave Soon

Inspection Tomorrow

Battery to go to Petewawa on August 8 under Major T. C. Barker

Militia activities in this section are in the limelight this week with the annual inspection of the 90th Howitzer Battery and the 7th Machine Gunners scheduled for tomorrow evening, preparatory to their going to camp early in August.

Brig-General R. O. Alexander, of Saint John, commander of Military District No. 7, will be here tomorrow evening to conduct the inspection of the two local units.

It was announced here today by Major T. C. Barker that the 80th Howitzer Battery will leave for Petewawa on August 8 for the usual summer ten days' period of training. Thirty of all ranks will be taken with Major Barker in command. Under him will be Captain J. L. Harrison, and Lieutenants Richards H. Gunter of this city, and L. D. Pottle of Moncton.

The 7th Machine Gunners will train at Valcartier and will leave on August 16, in command of Major Walter Blair. There will be twenty-six of all ranks.

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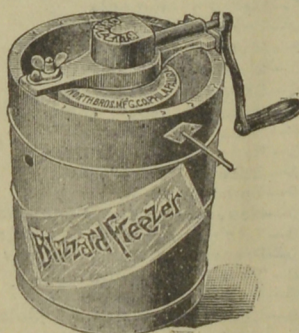
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
