

3 JUDGMENTS DELIVERED IN APPEAL COURT

King vs. Henry Landry
Case Set Aside, Prisoner to be Re-Tried

Foreclosure Action In
Case of John Donald vs.

Three judgments were handed out this morning by the New Brunswick Appeal Court at an adjourned sitting, with Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter presiding.

In the case of The King vs. Henry Landry, conviction was set aside and it was ordered that the prisoner who is now out on bail pending this appeal, be returned to the custody of the sheriff of Westmorland county and it was directed that he be tried again before a jury on the same indictment at the next circuit court for the County of Westmorland.

In the case of Elizabeth Pepper vs. the London Life Insurance Company, action was dismissed with costs to the appellant company.

The special appeal in the matter of the Workmen's Compensation Board in re Patrick Morrissey, deceased, the opinion of the court is that the executrix is entitled to the unpaid balance of the award to be paid to her in installments of \$20 per month until the full amount has been paid.

J. J. F. Winslow, K.C., in Chancery Court, entered a foreclosure action in the case of John Donald, plaintiff, vs. Frank E. Russell and Margaret E. Russell, his wife, defendants. Mr. Winslow asked for an adjournment to a time to be agreed upon by the court and counsels. P. J. Hughes, K.C., was named as counsel for the defendants but was not present. The adjournment was granted.

DR. P. J. VENIOT HERE TODAY TO ATTEND HEARING

Former Premire Is Expected to Press R. C. M. P. Charges

Arrived Last Night

Police Case Will Resume Here This Afternoon At 2.30 O'clock

Hon. Dr. P. J. Veniot, former postmaster-general, and whose charges against the New Brunswick R. C. M. P. on the floors of the House of Commons caused a storm of controversy in recent months, arrived here last night and is expected to press charges against the Police when the hearing by a Royal Commission resumes at 2.30 o'clock in the Parliament Buildings. The hearing had been opened by Chief Justice Baxter, commissioner, on Thursday of last week.

The R. C. M. P. represented by counsel at the opening of the hearing gave strong rebuttal evidence against four specific charges preferred against them by the Gloucester member.

Hon. Dr. Veniot's indictments were that the Mounties had used "third degree" methods on witnesses; that their boats lay idle at Bathurst while smugglers operated nearby; and that they burned food taken from the liquor vessel "Paul T." in the presence of persons on relief.

The former postmaster-general is expected to speak respecting the charges this afternoon.



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
