

SKETCHES OF MEMBERS OF NEW DYSART CABINET

Something About The Men Who Will Govern New Brunswick During The Next Five Years.

The personnel of New Brunswick's new cabinet presents an interesting cross-section of the professional, business of agricultural life of the province. There are three lawyers—Hon. A. A. Dysart, K. C.; Hon. J. B. McNair, K. C., and Hon. C. T. Richard. There is one medical man—Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts. Two members, while active also in the business life of their respective communities, are prominent in agriculture—Hon. A. C. Taylor and Hon. F. W. Pirie. One—Hon. W. S. Anderson—is active in the lumbering industry and also in business life. Hon. A. P. Paterson is prominent in Maritime business circles.

The Daily Mail has already published a personal sketch of Premier A. A. Dysart. Sketches of the other members of the Cabinet are as follows:—

Hon. J. B. McNair
Hon. J. B. McNair, K. C., B. C. L., Fredericton, member for York County, is the new Attorney-General. He was born at Andover, Victoria County on November 20, 1889, son of James and Frances Ann McNair, now residents of Fredericton. He had a brilliant career in his studies and in athletics at University of New Brunswick, from which he graduated in 1911, and at Oxford, where he was Rhodes scholar, graduating from Oxford with arts and law degrees in 1913 and 1914. He served overseas during the Great War, being a lieutenant with the Canadian anti-aircraft forces in France, and was in Germany following the armistice. He was admitted to the New Brunswick bar in 1919, since when he has been practising law at Fredericton, in partnership with J. J. F. Winslow.

Hon. C. T. Richard
Hon. C. T. Richard, Bathurst, the provincial secretary-treasurer, is a member for Gloucester County. He was born on May 8, 1892, son of Irene Richard and Marie (LeBlanc) Richard, French-Canadians. He received his B. A. degree from St. Joseph's University and his law degree from Dalhousie University law school. He married Alice Bernardette, daughter of John Hayes, Charlottetown, N. B., and has one daughter. He is prominent in North Shore legal circles. He is a member of the Knights of Columbus and the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association. He served in the Great War with the 9th Siege Battery and was first elected to the New Brunswick Legislature in a by-election in 1924 caused by the resignation of Hon. Dr. P. J. Veniot, Bathurst. He was re-elected in 1930. He is a member of the Roman Catholic Church.

Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts
Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, minister of health and labor, is a member for Saint John City. He was born at Saint John in December, 1869, son of John Vincent Roberts and Hannah S. P. (Porter) Roberts. He was educated in the public schools at Saint John and graduated in medicine on March 26, 1894, at Bellevue Hospital, New York City. He was first elected to

the New Brunswick Legislature in 1917 and was re-elected in 1920. He was appointed minister of health on October 4, 1918, and was reallocated the same portfolio on the formation of the Veniot ministry in February, 1923. He founded the first department of health in the British Empire and has been prominent in his profession. He is a member of the Masons, Foresters, Pythians, Templars and Orange orders, the Canadian clubs of Saint John and Boston and the Union Club, Saint John. On June 7, 1899, he married Lillian G. Granville, daughter of the late Captain Robert Granville, Saint John. He has one son living—Murray McLaren Roberts. He is a Baptist.

Hon. A. C. Taylor
Hon. A. C. Taylor, Salisbury, minister of agriculture, is a member for Westmorland County. He was born at Salisbury on June 20, 1893, son of Gesner A. Taylor, Dorchester, present county secretary-treasurer, and the late Susan Taylor. He was educated at public schools at North River and Salisbury and the Nova Scotia Agricultural College at Truro. He has been prominent for some years in farming and fox ranching activities, is a former president of the New Brunswick Farmers' and Dairymen's Association and the New Brunswick Sheep Breeders' Association and is proprietor of a farmers' co-operative feed store at Salisbury. He is active in the Masonic Order and holds a lieutenant's commission with the New Brunswick Rangers. He is a member of North River Second Baptist Church. He married, on June 30, 1914, Flora Hazel Alward, who died in 1930.

Hon. F. W. Pirie
Hon. F. W. Pirie, Grand Falls, member for Victoria County, the new minister of lands and mines, was born on February 1, 1892, at Red Rapids, Victoria County, son of William Pirie and Phoebe Martha (Roberts) Pirie. He was educated in the public schools at Grand Falls and at Mount Allison, Sackville. He married Adeline Clark of Limestone, Maine, and they have

three children. He is a member of the Masonic Order, is a former president of the Grand Falls Board of Trade, was mayor of Grand Falls for three years and was first elected to the New Brunswick Legislature in 1930. He takes an active interest in sports and formerly participated in its various branches. He started his business career in the lumber industry and later became prominently identified with the New Brunswick potato industry. He is president of F. W. Pirie, Ltd., and Builders' Supply Co., Ltd., and is an ardent fisherman. He is a member of the United Church.

Hon. W. S. Anderson
Hon. W. S. Anderson, member for Northumberland County, and a resident of Newcastle, is now minister without portfolio and chairman of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission. He was born on February 16, 1884, at Burnt Church, Northumberland County, son of William Anderson and Janet (Sewell) Anderson. He was educated at schools at Burnt Church and Chatham and in 1910 married H. Helen Morrison, daughter of James Morrison, Burnt Church, and they have seven children. He has been prominent for some years in the lumbering industry of New Brunswick and is a member of the firms of W. S. Anderson & Co., Ltd., Newcastle; Anderson Planing Mills Co., Ltd., Newcastle and McTavish, and Anderson Motor Co., Ltd., Newcastle. He is a member of the Highland Society of the Miramichi and the Masonic order. He was first elected to the New Brunswick Legislature in 1930. He is a member of the United Church of Canada.

Hon. A. P. Paterson
Hon. A. P. Paterson, president of the Executive Council, is a member for Saint John City. It is regarded as probable that Mr. Paterson will be minister of a department of federal relations, if such a department is created by the new government. He was born in Shediac, son of the late Alexander W. and Mary E. (Harding) Paterson, and is married and has two children. He is a member of Trinity Anglican Church, St. Andrew's Curling Club, Saint John, Union Club, Riverside Golf and Country Club Canadian Club, Rotary Club and Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club. He has been prominent in the business life of Saint John and the Maritime Provinces for years and has been actively identified with the work of the Maritime Board of Trade and the Maritime Transportation Commission. He has been an energetic advocate of Maritime Rights for many years.

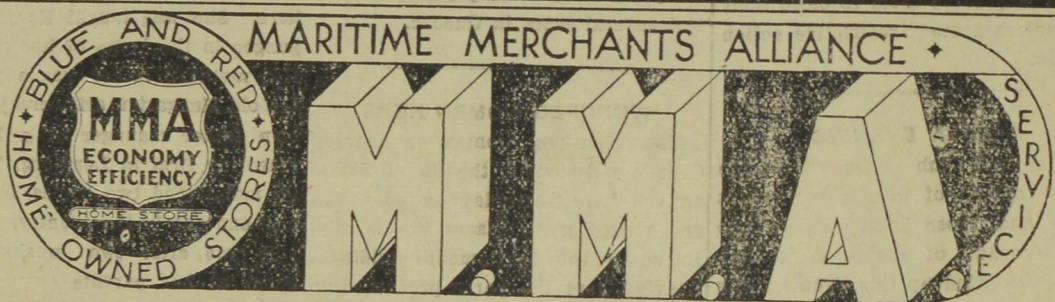
