## CURTAINS CAUGHT FIRE

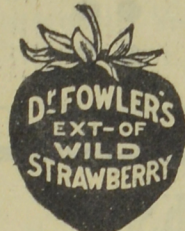

HAMMER HEAD  
SHARK 212 LBS.  
KILLED IN N. J.

POINT PLEASANT, N.J., July 18—A hammerhead shark weighing 212 pounds, measuring nine feet six inches and supporting a hammer nose measuring thirty-three inches in width, was killed at Jenkinson's bathing pavilion this afternoon by Al Brown, former Rutgers football star, and William Jacques, life guards at Jenkinson's, and Edward Eifert, a bather, after a fight lasting two hours and forty-five minutes.

The shark was first sighted just outside the bathing ropes shortly after 2 o'clock. Screams by bathers in the vicinity brought the life guards and Eifert to the scene in the life guard boat. With Jacques and Eifert rowing, Brown stood in the bow with a harpoon made by Jacques. After playing near the fish for twenty minutes Brown raised the harpoon and sank it in just behind the neck on the first try. Leaping and flapping in the water, the shark gave the three men a thrilling ride for about fifteen minutes, after which the victim apparently gave up.

An excited spectator who witnessed the contest telephoned the Manasquan Coast Guard station, which came to the scene in the station picket boat and shot the shark, taking it in tow to the anchorage landing at the Manasquan Inlet. The fish measures forty-four inches from fin tip to fin tip and was twenty-seven inches thick. An examination of the shark revealed about a foot of a sword fish bill lodged in its stomach in back of its left fin, which led to the belief that it must have been in conflict with a sword fish at some time. The fish was shipped to a New York fish market.
