The "March of Time", famous radio series of weekly news dramatizations first broadcast in March, 1931, will return to the nationwide WABC-Columbia network in August as a five-day-aweek feature. This will be the first time in radio history that daily dramatizations of the news will be present ed. The program will be heard every Monday through Friday in a quarter-hour period, the time to be an-

As a daily feature the program will dramatize the news in a graphic and dramatic style, a feature of the series since it was first conceived, and the large cast of noted radio actors who have previously been associated with the series will again take part. These actors have won wide favor for their ability to impersonate the leading figures of the day. Two other radio personalities-Arthur Pryor, Jr., director and Howard Barlow, conductor -also will continue in the series. They have been associated with the "March of Time" series since its inception.
