

### U. N. B. MALE STUDENTS IN CAMP 12 DAYS

Engineers, Foresters Geology Students To Be In Camp 12 Days

#### Practical Training

Profs. Turner, Gibson, Fleigher, Perry Have Charge of Group

With final examinations completed the usual summer camp for undergraduate engineers and foresters of the University of New Brunswick began on Monday. Engaged in theory all year the undergraduates will participate in about two weeks of actual practice at the separate professions. For the engineers and foresters it is a necessary part of the year's curricular study.

An innovation this year will be the going to camp of the geology students of the college under Prof. S. C. Perry, assistant professor of geology. About a half dozen students have entered the bush for specific training in geological survey work. It is the first year for such practical work by these students.

Prof. E. O. Turner is in charge of the engineers, and Prof. Miles Gibson and Prof. Byron Fleigher are in charge of the foresters. Camp lasts for about twelve days or two weeks.

The foresters will engage in survey, and timber cruising, while the engineers will run transit lines, and do some stream gauging. The geologists, under Prof. Perry, will be taught how to use the compass, etc. On Monday the foresters and geologists went into the bush a few miles outside the city and made camp for the two weeks' period of training. The engineers will assemble each morning at the college and from there will scatter out to various parts of York county in survey work of all kinds.

### NEW BRUNSWICK DIVORCE COURT OPENED HERE TODAY WITH ELEVEN CASES DOCKETED, UNDEFENDED

Mr. Justice Grimmer Presides at May Term of Divorce Court—Two of Cases From Fredericton—Decrees Granted This Morning.

Three judgments were handed out this morning at the May session of the New Brunswick Divorce Court by Mr. Justice Grimmer. In the case of Jessie Millner Searle, of Boston, vs. Roy Stanley Searle, of Saint John, a decree was granted dissolving the marriage, with costs. This case had been set over from a previous session of the court. C. R. Mersereau, W. M. Ryan, K.C., and W. A. I. Anglin, all of Saint John, appeared as counsels in the case.

In the case of Joseph Key of Saint John, vs. Dorothy Salmon Key, Ridgewood, N. J., a decree was granted. George M. Byron, of this city, and G. Sherman Dearborn, of Saint John, were heard as witnesses. In the second case, Ruby E. Donovan, of Saint John vs. Fredericton J. Donovan, of Saint John, the hearing of the evidence was not completed when court adjourned at 1 o'clock. M. B. Innes of Saint John, filed the petition.

Eleven cases in all are on the May docket. There are no remanets, and all of the eleven cases are undefended.

Three of the cases are from York county, and two of these are actions by Fredericton people. One of these is James Dudley Carlin vs. Dora Alberta Carlin in which C. R. Hawkins of this city, is filing the petition. The other is Annie Christina Day vs. Percy Martin Day in which Hanson, Dougherty & West of this city is filing the petition. The other York County action is brought by A. Lee Clark against Hazel Clark, and Hazen Libby of Presque Isle, Maine, is named as the co-respondent.

#### PLAYED WITH ENGLISH BAND

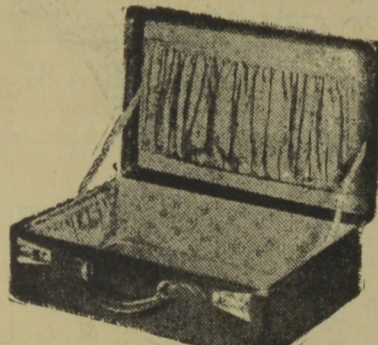

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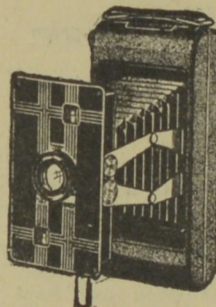
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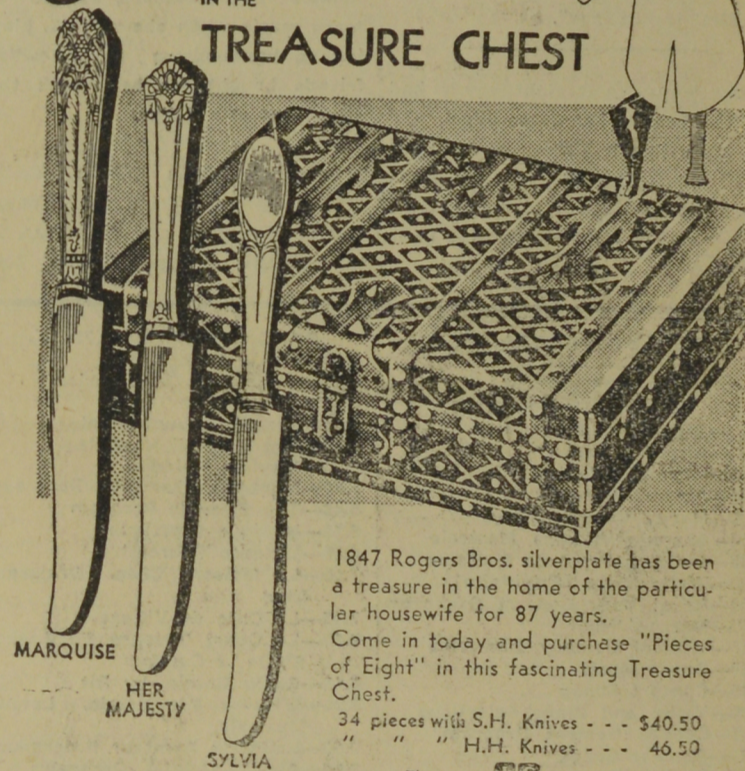
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
