Will Promote Efficiency
and Deal With All In-
terests of Civil Service

Much Interest Shown

R. P. Hartley, K.C., De-
puty Atty.-General, Is
Named President

Reorganization of the "The Provin-
cial Civil Service Association of New
Brunswick" was conducted yesterday
at a meeting held in the Corporations
committee room of the Parliament
Buildings.

The meeting called by R. P. Hart-
ley, K. C., Chairman of a committee
consisting of Messrs. R. P. Hartley, R.
G. Fulton, Dr. A. S. McFarlane, A. W.
Barbour, G. H. Prince, J. K. King, W.
K. Tibert, and Dr. William Warwick
appointed at a preliminary meeting or-
ganized about ten days ago to consid-
er a reorganization of the association.
The committee was asked to call a
meeting and prepare an agenda for its
consideration.

The meeting was opened with R. P.
Hartley in the chair as temporary
chairman.

On motion, W. K. Tibert was
asked to act as temporary secretary.
Mr. Hartley explained, in his opening
remarks, the object of the meeting
which was the reorganization under
the name of the Provincial Civil Ser-
vice Association of New Brunswick,
of the former Association, known as
the "The Provincial Civil Service of
New Brunswick", which was first or-
ganized in July, 1920, the object of the
reorganization being to promote effi-
ciency in the civil service of the Pro-
vince and to deal with all questions
that affected the interests of the civil

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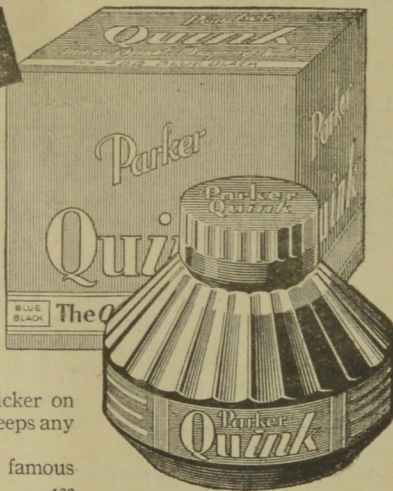
