FORBES-CLARK

A pretty wedding was solemnized at noon yesterday in St. George's Anglican Church, Moncton, when Norma Seaman Clark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Clark of that city, became the bride of Robert Borden Forbes, son of Mrs. Forbes and the late Robt. D. Forbes, of South Devon, N. B. The ceremony was performed by Rev. J. J. Alexander, rector of St. George's, assisted by Rev. J. T. Mawhinney, of St. Martin's in the Wood Anglican Church at Shediac Cape. It was the first wedding to be held in St. George's since the completion of the new church and the interior was very prettily decorated with white lilacs and pink roses. The sections reserved for guests were marked with sprays of pink sweet peas tied with white satin ribbon.

The bride was charmingly attired in a white satin regency period dress with plaited ruffle around the hem of the skirt and train, covered buttons up the back of jacket and sleeves to elbow; plaited collar on neck, standing up at back and framing the face; veil of white net falling at back of head from wreath of lilies-of-the-valley. A shower bouquet of white roses and lilies-of-the-valley was carried. She entered the church with her father to the strains of the bridal chorus from Lohengrin.

The bride's attendants were Miss Frances Storey, of Moncton, and Mrs. Delmas Olts, sister of the groom, of Fredericton. Both were attired in pale blue lace with blue lace packets, long sleeves and turn-back cuffs. They wore blue straw picture hats with wide pink bands tied in a bow on the right side, and carried bouquets of pink roses.

The bride's mother was dressed in cornflower blue lace dress with long-sleeved jacket and covered buttons. She wore a coarse straw hat of matching blue, white gloves and blue shoes, and a corsage bouquet of pink roses.

The groom was attended by his brother, Ald. C. Hedley Forbes as best man.

During the signing of the register, the choir of the church sang appropriate music, under the direction of the organist and choirmaster, Professor Woodhouse. Mendelssohn's wedding march was played as the recessional.

There were numerous guests from Moncton and many other places. Both Mr. and Mrs. Forbes are well known throughout the Maritimes, the groom having been a member of the Bank of Commerce staff and was for some time stationed in Moncton. He is now a member of the firm of Loughlin & MacKenzie, brokers, Fredericton. The bride is a graduate of the Halifax Ladies' College and Dalhousie University.

The bride's gifts to the bridesmaids were sets of sterling silver clip earrings set with marquises, and to the flower girl a silver bracelet. The groom's gift to the bride was a travelling bag, and to the best man and ushers, evening dress sets.

Following the ceremony, a reception was held at the home of the bride's parents. The interior of the house was prettily decorated with white lilacs, pink roses and other flowers. William D. VanDine, Cabinet Maker, Died In This City Today

The death occurred at an early hour this morning of William Dow VanDine at his home, 177 King Street, after an illness of some years. Deceased was born on August 5, 1850 in this city, where he has been a life long resident. He was in his eighty-fifth year.

For more than thirty years Mr. VanDine was associated with the J. C. Risteen Company as a cabinet maker, having retired several years ago because of ill-health. He was twice married and is survived by his widow two daughters, Mrs. Keith C. Dorcas, of Harvey and Mrs. Jessie E. MacDermott of West Newton, Mass.; one son, Enoch, of Saskatchewan; seven grandchildren and one great grandchild. Mr. VanDine will be greatly missed by a large circle of friends.

The funeral will take place from the residence on King Street on Thursday afternoon with service at 2:30 o'clock to be conducted by Rev. Mr. Linton. Interment will be made in the Rural cemetery.

Dismissed Case, But Warned Auto Driver

Although he dismissed the case, Police Magistrate Walter Limerick in the police court this morning trying the case of the King vs. John Brawn of Hainesville, charged with being in charge of a motor vehicle on May 18 in this city owing to the presence of which an accident occurred to Mrs. Alice Morris of Kingsclear, declared that had the case been tried under the Motor Vehicle Act, instead of the Criminal Code, he might have found Brawn guilty.

Under the Criminal Code charge Brawn was charged with failing to stop his car to render assistance and that he attempted to escape liability. The Crown could not prove this charge under the Criminal Code. Evidence in this case was taken in the police court earlier this week with the informant, Mrs. Morris, Coburn Kelly of Kingsclear, and Guy Kitchen, of Springfield appearing as witnesses. Mrs. Hanson and Brawn testified for the defence. J. J. F. Winslow, K.C., acted for the accused while the prosecution was conducted by Chief of Police Nathaniel Jones.

Hour of Music Enjoyed By Large Number

"An Hour of Music" program put on in St. Andrew's Presbyterian church last evening, commencing at 8:30 was greatly enjoyed by a large number of music lovers of this city, who filled the auditorium of the church almost to capacity. The artists were Robin C. Bayley, organist; Herbert Webber, violinist, Miss Doris Bayley, reader; Charles Johnston, tenor; George Johnston, baritone; Fred MacArthur, violoncellist. The program was well varied and besides the numerous solo numbers there was a duet by Charles and George Johnston and a trio composed of Messrs. Webber, MacArthur and Bayley. Rev. Dr. G. E. Ross spoke during the intermission pointing out the necessity and effect of music in our lives.

Organ numbers by Mr. Bayley at the opening and closing included an arioso from Bach and "Chorale Prelude on the Old 104th", by Sir Hubert Parry. Mr. Bayley's technique at the organ is rapidly attaining a surety and command and speaks well for his musical future. Charles Johnston sang well two numbers, "In a Monastery Garden", and "Trees", and "Ah, So Pure", the famous air from "Martha" of von Flowtow's sung by George Johnston was done with sustained beauty of tone which indicated that this young singer is rapidly becoming Fredericton's outstanding baritone. "Serenade" by Victor Herbert was performed with great skill by Herbert Webber who is a violinist of considerable ability.

Miss Doris Bayley gave several readings which pleased the audience. Among her readings was one, "Day That I Have Loved", by the post Rupert Brooke. Miss Miriam Eardley was the accompanist. The complete program carried out was as follows:


