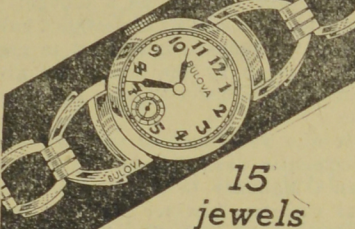

THE WONDERFUL MAGNET FURNACE**C.W.L. CONVENTION  
MEETS ST. STEPHEN**

ST. STEPHEN, Sept. 16—The Catholic Women's League has made a marked contribution to the national life of Canada, it was evidenced in reports read at the annual convention of the St. John diocesan sub-division which was formally opened here this morning in Holy Rosary Parish Hall. The sum of \$196.160 had been raised throughout Canada, \$187,000 of which had been distributed in localities where the league was organized. This disbursement covered educational, charitable, religious and general philanthropic work.

After opening remarks by the president the delegates were welcomed by the honorary chaplain Rev. A. P. Allen. Miss Amelia Haley, national second vice-president and diocesan president reported on the national convention which met in Ottawa and was the largest ever held. The report showed that each year, through voluntary contributions, sub-divisions pledged \$3,500 in support of home missions, under the supervision of the Sisters of Service working in Western Canada. Six hostels were maintained throughout Canada and, during the year, 104,231 meals were provided; 36,171 beds had been provided and 1,408 girls had been placed for employment by these 63 lay workers, who conducted catechetical instruction from the centres at Edmonton and Regina. More than 23,000 special bulletins had been sent out by them, while 12,400 catechetical lessons had been forwarded to remote districts, together with 15,397 corrected lessons.

During the summer, the Sisters of Service travelled in vans, establishing personal contact. At the ports of Halifax and Quebec, 172 ships had been met by these workers. Cottage hospitals had been established at Edson and Vilna, Alta., where 999 patients had been cared for during the 11,541 hospital days.

**Girl Guide Work**

Girl Guide work, Miss Haley said, was one of the greatest endeavors of the league. A decided stimulus was reported in the work. Companies sponsored by C.W.L. now totalled 71. The Lady Bessborough shield had been won by one C.W.L. company in Quebec and other awards were reported.

**Mrs. Coffey Heard**

Stating that the Catholic Women's League was pre-eminently a lay movement to unite all Catholic women in a bond of common fellowship, Mrs. Coffey, national president, in her address spoke of the aims and objects of the league—to unite Catholic women for the promotion of social work, religious and intellectual interests; to foster among Catholics correct public opinion on questions of the day; the betterment of Catholic action and social harmony. Mrs. Coffey outlined the formation of the league in 1920 and dwelt on the accomplishments through the intervening years.

**TOPIC WAS EDUCATION**

F. E. MacDiarmid was the special speaker at today's Rotary luncheon, his topic being Education. Mr. MacDiarmid sketched the growth of education and told of its application in the schools. Walton K. Tibert was the chairman, and there was a fairly large attendance of Rotarians.
