Original Contracts

The two contracts to be proceeded with under original specifications are the Dufferin Company contract in the Westfield area and the Currier & Seymour contract, a short distance above Fredericton.

In regard to the Westfield contract it has been thought advisable, said the premier, not to alter the original specifications and regard has been taken to the density of winter traffic there. The Currier & Seymour contract also will be unchanged as it is believed that the saving would be relatively small even if the contract was changed.

The intention generally in the Saint John, Fredericton and Moncton areas is to stand by the original specifications, and note has been taken of the traffic density in those areas. Nothing has yet been announced, however, respecting the Moncton area.

The Cabinet did not meet this morning but will hold a meeting this afternoon, and it is expected that the Cabinet will wind up its business tonight.

The new government decided at a meeting last night to continue the previous government's policy of providing a bonus for lake fishermen.

The bonus will be given on the same basis as last year—20 cents per hundredweight—Premier Dysart said, and the entire cost will be met by the provincial government. He pointed out that in the year before last, the federal government assisted by paying one-half the amount of the bonus but that last year the province had carried the entire burden, which amounted to about \$11,600.

A Charlotte County delegation urging that the bonus be continued, waited on the government last night. Members of the delegation were Dr. A. D. Dyas, M.L.A.-elect, and J. W. Scovill, Milltown. Strong representations had been made to the government by letter, on behalf of the fishermen, by J. J. Hayes Doone, M.P.P.-elect, Black's Harbor, and Foster G. Calder, M.L.A.-elect, Fairhaven, Deer Island, the premier said.

AIDED BY MINTO
MINERS, PASTOR
WINS SCHOLARSHIP

RAWDON, GOLD MINES, N.S., July 19—A native Nova Scotian who was taught the German language by Minto miners, while pastor for three years of the United Church in the New Brunswick mining town, Rev. A. S. Murray will sail from Halifax on August 3, on his way to Germany. Mr. Murray will study theology for one year at a Berlin university, as winner of a scholarship competition in which he was eligible to compete through the knowledge of the German tongue which he gained in his New Brunswick pastorate. Leaving Minto to June last, he is now pastor of Rawdon United Church.

The scholarship won by Mr. Murray is one provided by the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation of Berlin for competition by Canadian University graduates who speak German. The course begins on November 1 and ends on July 31 next year, and the winner was determined from among many applicants only after searching examinations. Mr. Murray was notified of his success recently from the head office at Berlin. He is a graduate of Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown; Dalhousie University and Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, and Teachers' College, Columbia University.

On his trip abroad, Mr. Murray will be accompanied by his father, Rev. Robert Murray, and in London, they will be met by Dr. Florence Murray, a sister, who was in Damascus recently on her way home from Korea, where she is a medical missionary. They plan to visit the ancestral home in Dornoch, Sutherland, Scotland, following which Mr. Murray will continue to Berlin.

In commenting on his success recently, Mr. Murray said, "It was in Minto that the local Germans taught me enough of the language to compete for the scholarship." He stated that he would take classes in German before leaving to freshen his knowledge of the language.

Store Proprietor

William J. White, aged 80 years, who conducted a grocery store in this city for twenty years, passed away at an early hour this morning at his home, 466 Needham street. The late Mr. White was born in Springfield, Maine, but has resided in this city for the past forty years during twenty years of which time he was known and respected as the honest proprietor of a small grocery store. At Consecration of Rt. Rev. Dr. Philip Carrington, Newly-Created Bishop of Quebec.

Quebec, July 19. — When the consecration of Rt. Rev. Dr. Philip Carrington, newly created Bishop of the Diocese of Quebec, takes place July 25 a number of leading Anglican clergymen will participate in the ceremonies, it was learned today.

The actual consecration of the Lordbishop, formerly Dean of Divinity of Lennoxville College, will be performed by the Most Rev. John A. Richardson, Archbishop of Fredericton, while the epistle will be read by Dr. John MacKenley, Bishop of Nova Scotia. Rt. Rev. John Farthing, Bishop of Montreal, will read the gospel. Dean A. H. Crowfoot of Quebec, will preach the sermon, Dr. John P. Wells, Chancellor of the Diocese, reading the certificate of election and other documents pertaining to the installation of the Lordship.

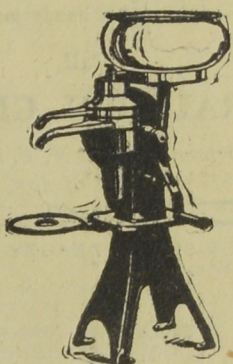
