

N. B. ROAD WORK ORDERED TO GO AHEAD

Premier Dysart Announces Some Changes To Be Made in Contracts

Net Unit Price Planned

Westfield And Fredericton Areas to Continue, Original Specifications

Premier A. A. Dysart from his office at the parliament buildings here today announced that general orders have been issued to contractors to continue the hard-surfacing road programs in the province until substantially all the material on hand is used up. This work had been suspended for several weeks by the new government pending possible revision of specifications, with possible reduction in the cost of material used. Altogether fifteen contracts for hard-surfacing of provincial highways instituted under the Tilley regime had been under temporary suspension.

In making the announcement early this afternoon Premier Dysart declared that some of the original contracts will be changed to meet new specifications, and two contracts have been authorized to be proceeded with under the original specifications. Those to work under the new specifications involve a new unit price on surface only and this is now under consideration.

Fine Ceremony At A & B Club House, More Than 6,000 Present

Saint John Power Boat Club Fleet Left On Return Cruise

The A. & B. Club House presented a spectacle of color and glamour last evening as the annual summer regatta and water sports program reached its climax in the presentation of prizes won during the afternoon's water sports, a band concert, and dance. It was estimated today that between 6,000 and 7,000 people were on the grounds near the A. & B. Club last evening, and at eleven o'clock there was no parking space anywhere within three blocks of the scene.

The Saint John Power Boat Club fleet left at about 10:30 o'clock this morning on the return cruise to St. John, after spending an enjoyable two days here. They will stop at Gagetown tonight.

Besides the cups and trophies already named as being donated for the aquatic events yesterday, cups also were donated by General Dairies, Limited, J. Clark & Sons, M. Ryan & Sons, Mavor Brothers Ltd., and Shute & Co.

The club house was crowded both inside and on the veranda during the ceremony of presentation of the prizes and hundreds of people promenaded on the river bank and patronized the concessioners immediately in the vicinity of the club house. Arrangements had previously been made for broadcasting the speeches from the verandah and loudspeakers were spaced at appropriate points.

RIVER SHOWS GRADUAL FALL RECENT WEEKS

St. Croix Pulp & Paper Co. Have Drive of 2800 Cords This Week.

Rainfall Slight

River Level Has Dropped Two and Half Feet Since June Freshet

The St. John river is gradually declining from its June freshet level, having dropped about two feet since June's high mark. The opinion was expressed at the pumping station today that there is likely to be a continued fall from now until the fall rains.

The St. Croix Pulp & Paper Company this week floated about 2,800 cords of pulp, starting its drive a short distance above Woodstock. Its destination is the Mitchell boom here and some of the pulp is already floating past the city. The larger drive of the Port Royal Pulp & Paper Company is not expected to be commenced until early in the fall. Something like 10,000 cords of pulpwood will be floated down river by this concern, destined for Saint John.

The past week or two has witnessed only slight rainfall which has accounted for the low point in the river level. The river at this point fell almost a foot in the last twenty four hours and is now only about three feet and four inches above summer low.

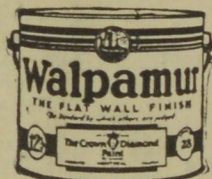
