**MEMORIAL TO
104TH REGIMENT
BEAUTIFUL ONE**Work on the monument in honor of
the officers and men of the 104th Reg-
iment who made the famous march to
Quebec in the early winter of 1813,
has now been completed. The unveil-
ing ceremony will take place on Sep-
tember 26 on which date special cere-
monies will take place in conjunction.
The inscription on the monument fol-
lows:**THE 104th
NEW BRUNSWICK
REGIMENT**"Commemorating its distinguished
services in the defence of Canada in
1813-1814, its endurance in the win-
ter march through the wilderness to
Quebec, its fortitude and valour at
Sackett's Harbour, Beaver Dam, the
blockade of Fort George, the Battle of
Lundy's Lane and the assault on Fort
Erie.

The memorial is a handsome gran-
ite cairn capped with a smooth finish
bronze tablet is inset from the side,
facing the city. The tablet has a bor-
der of pine needles and pine cones
