

LIBERALS OPEN CAMPAIGN AT LAKEVILLE CR.

Mayor Clark, York-Sunbury Candidate, Assails Bennett Policies

Farmers to Benefit

A. W. Coombes, Major Lawson and Several Others Also Spoke

The opening guns of the Liberal campaign in York-Sunbury counties, were fired last night at Lakeville Corner, when His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark candidate in the coming election, opened the series of county meetings. Strongly opposed to the present governmental tariff policies, Mayor Clark assailed the Bennett policies on the ground that they were for the benefit of the manufacturers of Ontario and Quebec. Additional speakers were Bert Sutherland, A. W. Coombes, Major W. C. Lawson, E. Allison MacKay and Frank Osborne. Percy Barker acted as chairman.

Mayor Clark said that the Bennett policies were not for the benefit of the farmers of the Maritime Provinces. He maintained that the manufacturers and business houses here are dependent upon the status of the farmer. The Liberal policy is to secure trade "and trade is what our farmers need."

Gone the Limit

Major Lawson said that if we reelect Bennett, we will have the "taxation to the limit" policy. He said that Mr. Bennett, in the matter of taxation, had gone the limit to work a hardship on this country.

Mr. A. W. Coombes maintained that the Reconstruction party was composed of one man. He asked, "Where would the Reconstruction Party be if anything happened to Stevens. He maintained that the Reconstruction party was born as the result of a feud."

Bert Sutherland analysed the different parties of Canada in the light of a reduction of tariff, restoration and reform policy. He said that all parties are crying reform. But he maintained that for the present under the capitalistic system, reform measures are useless, unless we have a policy such as reduction of tariffs accompanied by increased trade, which would stimulate business conditions.

Mr. MacKay maintained that the Stevens party is more of a vote-catching machine than a construction platform.

Mr. Osborne attacked the high price of automobiles. He said that we needed a lower tariff schedule for the benefit of the consumer.

NASHWAAKSIS MAN GORED TO DEATH BY BULL

Peter L. McFarlane, Farmer, Died in Victoria Hospital

Funeral Tomorrow

Chain on Bull Became Loose: Body Trampled and Hooked

Gored by an enraged bull, Peter L. McFarlane, 66 year old farmer of Nashwaaksis, died in the Victoria Hospital at 7:30 o'clock last evening, five hours after the bull loosed its chain and trampled and hooked the farmer's body in the farmyard of the McFarlane homestead.

The horrible incident occurred between two and three o'clock in the afternoon and the first indication of the tragedy was given to Mrs. McFarlane by the dog, which ran to the house, barking loudly. Investigating, Mrs. McFarlane discovered her husband's body where the bull had gored it. His body was badly mangled by the hoofs and horns of the enraged bull.

Chain Loosened

It is believed that while Mr. McFarlane was taking the animal back to the barn after feeding or watering it, that the chain about the bull's neck became loosened somehow. The animal must have become enraged for some reason. Mr. McFarlane was removed to the hospital at once but he lived only a short time, so serious were his injuries.

Dr. Charles MacKay, coroner, investigated the details of the accident after it occurred, and found no cause for an inquest. Roy McFarlane, a son, had used a pitchfork to scare the bull away from the victim's body, and Lloyd Johnson, a neighbor, arrived some time after the accident and shot the bull. Dr. MacKay attributed death to the impact of the bull when it first charged the Nashwaaksis man, rather than to the goring, and also to extreme shock.

The late Mr. McFarlane is survived by his wife two sons, Donald of California, and Roy, at home; also three brothers, Fred, Gordon and Alexander of Nashwaaksis.

The body is resting at the funeral home of H. R. Adams, King Street, today. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon with service from the home at 2:30 o'clock and will be under the auspices of Alexandria Lodge No. 33 of North Devon. Rev. George Telford will officiate and interment will be made at the Douglas Burial Ground.

The late Mr. McFarlane was a member of St. Andrews Society and also of the Masonic Lodge No. 33, North Devon. Yesterday's tragedy will be learned in this section of the province with sincere regret for Mr. McFarlane was highly regarded by all who knew him.

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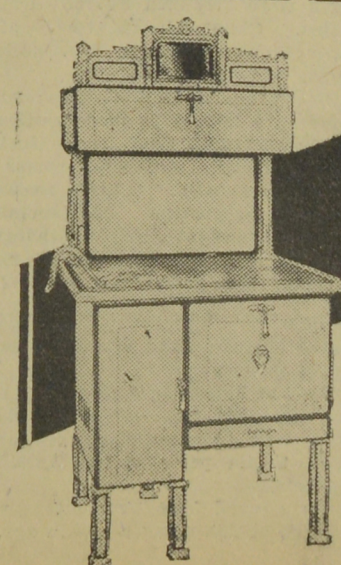
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
